BRIEF STATE NEWS

The farmers' elevator at Parshall was totally destroyed by fire Friday. Spontaneous combustion is believed to have been the cause.

Real black coons have been giving the authorities at Drake much trouble. They were recently rounded up, corralled and are now serving jail sentences.

Banker Dobbin of Overloy took part in the auto race at Omamee. He went somewhat faster than the old horse Dobbin we used to read about in the old Fourth reader.

The Fargo Forum complains because some print paper which has just been ordered cost \$1,600 a car more than the former price, and thinks that a congressional investigation is urgent.

Mrs. Booker T. Washington of Tuskegee institute, Alabama, addressed a large audience of Grand Forks people at the Methodist church, telling of a remarkable work of social uplift being carried on by that institution in the south.

Thad Michael, the Willow City publisher, goes on fishing trips with one of the local preachers. They sleep in hay mows, swap yarns and fight mosquitoes together, but Falkenstein of

the Bottineau News figures that Thad can never be converted that way.

In a severe storm that struck McKenzie county J. C. Olson's barn at Charlson was struck by lightning and Tom Quale's barn, under construction, was blown down. Hugh Hyers' barn at Berg was blown down and lightning destroyed A. O. Hoesseline's barn.

Rye harvest is under way in the Sentinel Butte region. Cutting operations began the first of the present week and with an excellent stand of grain. The harvesting of small grain will be general in two or three weeks. All grains, corn and grass crops are doing exceptionally well.

The production of lignite in North Dakota in 1915, according to the United States Geological Survey, amounted to 528,078 tons, an increase of 21,393 tons, or four per cent, as compared with 1914. The output of 1915 was valued at \$707,072. Practically all the lignite mined in North Dakota is used within the state, and nearly half of it is consumed at the place of production, not even being loaded on railroad cars. The increase in population is followed by greater use of coal, and although lignite, except in the remote districts, is not largely used for domestic fuel, the industries, such as brick making, that do use lignite are growing, and with their growth the production of lignite has increased steadily. There were 590 men employed in the mining of lignite in North Dakota in 1915 for an average of 219 days, as compared with 558 men for 216 days in 1914. The average output per man per day was four tons and for the year 895 tons, as against 4.2 tons per day and 908 tons for the year in 1914.

HOME FOR THE OLD AND DISABLED OF STATE

O. S. Cowley, a Hazen, N. D., philanthropist, has undertaken to establish a home in North Dakota for old and disabled workmen who do not belong to any benevolent order and who are not eligible to enter any Old Soldiers' Home. He is putting in about \$3,500 worth of property, consisting of 160 acres for site and a little money besides. He is asking the farmers' and labor organizations and others to assist. He is asking the leading newspapers of North Dakota to put the proposition up to their readers to contribute ten cents each towards the fund and later he expects this to become a state institution.

HALF MILLION FOR NON-PARTISAN SINKING FUND

President Townley of the non-partisan league is making addresses about the state raising money for a sinking or protective fund for the league. He says that from \$300,000 to \$500,000 will be necessary. Bottineau farmers subscribed about \$2,500.

NORTH DAKOTA REGIMENT LEAVES FOR SOUTH

The battalion of which Co. D. of Minot is a part, entrained at Bismarck at 10:10 Saturday in a driving rain and left Bismarck Sunday morning at 1:15 a. m. The regiment had breakfast at Oakes and later a street parade and rifle drill. Dinner was eaten at Redfield, S. D., where a street parade was held. The boys stopped at Huron, S. D., one hour for sightseeing. Privileges were granted for 35 minutes. Crops were good all along the way. Harvesting is on in South Dakota. Everybody was reported well.

Herd of Twelve Registered Guernsey Cattle Sent to the State Fair by Mr. Person

Fargo Forum: E. S. Person, owner of the Person Stock farm, 2 1/2 miles west of Minot, has sent a herd of twelve registered Guernsey cattle to the North Dakota state fair. During the week this herd has been one of the centers of attraction, and has excited no little favorable comment.

Mr. Person is a master stock raiser and breeder, and each of his animals is a strong, virgous producer and reproducer. His exhibit here is under the care of J. A. Sorenson, manager of the farm.

Mr. Person owns Lura Bettina, the champion butter fat cow of North Dakota. Her official record at four years and one month was as follows: 10,928.8 pounds of butter fat; 633.02 pounds of butter fat; at five years and four months, 14,001.02 pounds of milk; 739.58 pounds of butter fat.

It is hardly necessary to say that Mr. Person's herd was a point winner.
