HOOSIERS HELD AN ENJOYABLE PICNIC

Indiana Club of Ward County Made Merry at Riverside Park—Big Feed—Interesting Program

The Indiana Club of Ward county held a very enjoyable picnic at Riverside park Friday. The weather was ideal and a crowd of two or three hundred gathered from various sections of the county, the larger number coming in autos.

Covers were laid for the entire party, who sat about long tables under the trees. The gentle breeze was blowing through the trees, the birds were singing and the merry-makers were reminded of their old homes on the Wabash, far away. The menu consisted of those delectable viands such as only the good Hoosier housewives know how to prepare. There was fried spring chicken, done to a crisp brown, a score of pickles of varieties that would put Heinze to shame, fruit in all forms, some of which had been put up in Indiana years ago. Mrs. Wm. Handler brought a can of red cherries which she had preserved in her old Indiana home ten years ago. Real lemonade and ice cream, apple pie that made one's mouth water to look at and forty other things that would tempt the worst dyspeptic.

After dinner the children enjoyed the swings and the grown-ups took them around to the zoo to see the bear, the elk and other animals. A good social time was enjoyed, tales of the good old Hoosier days being related, but not one of the natives of old Indiana manifested any sorrow at coming to the state of their adoption where all have prospered so well.

At 2 o'clock C. C. Wysong, president of the club, called the meeting to order. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year.

At the conclusion of the business meeting the president, who is an orator of no small ability, gave an interesting and quite eloquent address. He referred to the high type of citizenship the state of Indiana has produced and paid a glowing tribute to the character of the men and women who left that state to make their homes as pioneers in North Dakota. He referred to the great soldiers and statesmen who have come from Indiana.

Chas. W. Clendenning of Surrey, who spent most of his life in Indiana, was the next speaker. Mr. Clendenning is an educational instructor and a scholar. As a speaker he proved most delightful. He knows all about the state of Indiana and he waxed eloquent as he eulogized Oliver P. Morton, the old war governor, Lew Wallace, the author of Ben Hur; Charles Major, author of When Knighthood was in Flower; Former President Benj. Harrison, Former Vice President Thos. A. Hendricks, Senator John W. Kern, and other prominent Hoosiers. He said the former residents of Indiana had played an important part in the development of Ward county and North Dakota generally. He thinks so much of both Indiana and North Dakota that if he had two little girls to name, he would call one of them Indiana and the other Dakota.

G. D. Colcord, who was a guest, made a few extemporaneous remarks, explaining that while he was an interloper to a degree, he being a Sucker, was a half-brother to a Hoosier. He referred to the great poet, James Whitcomb Riley, who was the most characteristic Hoosier of them all.

At the conclusion of the short program the picnicers enjoyed a treat of several gallons of ice cream donated by the Scofield Implement company.

The Indiana club proved to be fine entertainers and we hope to get another invitation to attend some future celebration.
