REFUSED ADMITTANCE

The Executive committee of the Equity Co-operative Exchange met last Tuesday with the Board of Directors of the South St. Paul Livestock Exchange and were informed by the latter that they could not purchase a membership on the South St. Paul Livestock Exchange by reason of the fact that they are going to return to the shippers of livestock all the profit made by their organization, in other words, they are going to give back to the shippers all of the commissions less just what it costs to handle the stock. This is contrary to the rules of the South St. Paul Livestock Exchange, hence they will not admit the

farmers to membership. The farmers will, however, begin business October first, as an independent firm.

New Moravian Church at Tagus
The Liturgical service for the laying of the cornerstone of the new Moravian church at Tagus will be held at three o'clock on the afternoon of Sept. 24. The Rt. Rev. Karl A. Mueller, member of the Provincial Elders' Conference and president of the Western District Executive Board, will officiate at this service. The pastor of the church is Rev. Eugene L. Michel. The elders are Ira D. Bush, Wm. H. Caine and A. W. Olsen.

Nearly Two Million Dollars Are Deposited with Second National
According to the statement published by the Second National bank this week, the total deposits, including capital stock of \$100,000, surplus and undivided profits of \$121,922.40 and circulation of \$75,000, amounts to \$1,933,023.99.

POULTRY POINTERS
Feed the birds a well balanced ration and allow them to molt naturally. Sunflower seed will help to make the feathers grow and also will help to make them glossy and attractive. A good laying ration ought to be a good feather growing ration. Supply plenty of grain food and some meat. Give them shade and keep them free from lice.

The greatest number of eggs are laid during the pullet year, and the next greatest number the year following. On the average farm it is not profitable to keep a bird for egg production after her second year unless she is especially valuable for breeding purposes.

The pullets should be put in their winter quarters at least a month before they are expected to commence laying. In order that they may become accustomed to their new quarters. Only strong, vigorous birds should be put in the laying pen. Keep everything around the poultry house sanitary. Before the pullets are put in the laying pens the house should be given a thorough cleaning. Spray the interior of the house with a good disinfectant. Bear in mind the old saying "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." A large proportion of the poultry diseases are due to improper feeding. Feed nothing but foods that are in good condition. Keep the drinking water pure and fresh.

THE SCREENING PROBLEM

The dockage on wheat at the local elevator now runs from 1 to 32 pounds on the bushel. The chief ingredient found in the screenings is wild oats. There are also found in quantities increasing from year to year, mustard, kinghead and cockle. In ninety-five cases out of a hundred, the farmer sells his wheat to the local elevator where it is graded and docked and the price determined. Five per cent of the farmers ship their own grain direct to the terminal market.

There are now in North Dakota four principal ways of meeting the dockage and screenings problem.

1. The local elevator cleans the wheat, giving the farmer the screenings and charging him one cent per bushel, or in some cases, two cents a

bushel for the work. But this can only be done in slack seasons, for during the wheat movement the elevator is swamped with its own business. The farmer receiving his screenings, returns them to the farm and grinds them for stock feed. If the screenings are not ground, they may scatter foul seed about the place.

2. The local elevator cleans the wheat and ships the screenings in car lots to the terminal market. In this case the farmer is docked on the foul matter in his grain and allowed nothing for the screenings. One manager last year made \$2,000 on his screenings; another made \$5,000. The screenings were sold at fifteen dollars a ton. If the elevator is a farmers elevator, these profits are pro-rated back at the end of the year. If it is a line or independent elevator, the farmer gets nothing back.

3. The farmer ships his own grain to the terminal market, has it cleaned there, and the screenings sold. In this way he gets full price for his screenings and escapes with little or no dockage on his wheat.

The farmer ships his own grain to the terminal market and sells it uncleaned. Here he suffers the dockage

which the State Inspection department finds he deserves.—J. E. B., N. D. Exp. Sta.
