



A heavy hail storm visited Rugby Tuesday noon, the ground being covered with good-sized hail stones.

Mr. and Mrs. Gustav Ludtke from north of the city are the happy parents of a little son born recently.

Olaf Muus, merchant prince from White Earth, was in the city last week transacting business and visiting with friends.

L. J. Thompson shot two geese near the Susak farm north of the city that tipped the scales at seven and eight pounds each.

Prof. K. Lokensgard, after spending several weeks with his brother, Olaf Lokensgard, returned to his home at Madison, Minn., Monday.

C. G. Raichle, who has had charge of the DeLaval office of Salt Lake City for several months, has returned to assist in the work at Minot.

David Myers, of Oklahoma City, Okla., is being entertained at the home of his brother, Phil Myers. This is his first visit to our city.

Lyle Thompson, county auditor, who is some kind of a hunter, succeeded in bagging two geese while hunting in the hills southwest of the city.

Cal Andrist, publisher of the Noonan Miner, was in the city Saturday. He submitted to an operation that day for the removal of a growth from his good

right hand which has been giving him some trouble for several months and the surgeon assures him that he will recover rapidly.

Mrs. John Sindlingen, who was visiting at Omaha, Neb., returned home on Friday after visiting friends and relatives the past three months.

E. H. Ray, the Surrey grain dealer, recently bought the James W. Foley farm southeast of Surrey. He is feeding 121 head of sheep on the farm.

Hunters report that the earlier flight of the northern ducks has begun and the best duck hunting of the season will be enjoyed during October.

Mr. and Mrs. Chester Hoover, who spent the past year at Great Falls, Mont., have returned and are now occupying the Torgrimson farm near Daering.

Miss Lillian Evans, who has been engaged in nursing at Anamoose for several weeks, visited relatives in this city Tuesday enroute to her farm near Burlington.

Wm. Abraham from southwest of the city threshed a field of wheat that averaged 23 bushels per acre. The wheat was sown very early on summer following.

England's toll in the war during the past three months has been more than 300,000 men, an average of about 3800 soldiers a day. These men have either been killed, wounded or captured along the Somme.

Dan W. King had excellent success growing flax on old land this year. He threshed flax that averaged 12 bushels per acre from land that had been crop-

ped continuously for the past ten years. Sometimes excellent flax can be grown on old land, but one has to farm it just right.

Peter Vandenoever and Dr. Bruggman while hunting at Buffalo Lodge the first of the week, spied a flock of about fifty of the small black geese, unfortunately out of range of their 75 centimeter weapons.

H. O. Hulberg from south of the city was in town today. He reports satisfactory progress being made with the construction of the new Saron Lutheran church south of the city. The structure is up ready for shingling.

A big barn dance will be held at the Con Brennan farm near Foxholm Friday night. Mr. Brennan has just finished a large new barn and will hold a celebration that will long be remembered. Quigley's orchestra from this city will furnish the music.

Archie D. McCannel, Most Eminent Commander of DeMolay Commandery, announces that the lodge will open Monday night for the first meeting of the season. Considerable business will be transacted at the opening meeting and their appears to be a busy season ahead.

Prairie chickens are so scarce that hunters all declare that a law should be enacted protecting these birds for two or three years. If we are going to protect our native grouse it will do no good to do so after they are exterminated. The coming legislature will most likely give this matter its attention.

F. S. Woodiwiss, from east of the city, sold the first load of sheep ever disposed of in Surrey last week, Sam Yoder being the buyer. Mr. Woodiwiss keeps in the neighborhood of a hundred sheep on his farm and finds that they pay very well. The clip from 50 of them amounted to nearly a hundred dollars.

F. L. Seck from north of the city threshed 700 bushels of Marquis wheat from 40 acres, an average of 16 bushels per acre. He is saving the entire crop for seed, which will be in great demand in the spring. Mr. Seck built a new house and barn on his farm during the summer and now has an exceptionally well improved farm.

Edward Devol, of Huntington, W. Va., who was here to attend the J. S. Wallace funeral, returned home Friday of last week. Mr. Devol expects to dispose of his drug store at Huntington and move his household effects here where Mr. and Mrs. Devol will make their future home. Mrs. Devol did not return to Huntington at this time but will remain here with her mother until Mr. Devol's return.


