#### SENDING RECRUITS TO THEIR HOMES

C. Reimann, who is in charge of the naval recruiting in this city, received a telegram this afternoon from James D. Willson, in charge of the naval recruiting for Minnesota and North Dakota, congratulating him on the excellent work done. Minneapolis has exceeded Kansas City in the total number of recruits and enlistments have been made so rapidly that Mr. Reimann has received orders to send no more apprentice seamen to the training stations, but, instead, allow them to enlist, send them to their homes on full pay, to report as soon

as the government is able to take care of them.

The quota of naval recruits for the two states was 800 and this has been exceeded by 500 to date.

Mr. Reimann says that the smaller towns have furnished most of the recruits. He said that Minot had furnished but one or two. He returned from a trip down in the southwestern part of the state where he received recruits as follows: Dickinson, 2; Beach, 2; Medora, Roosevelt's old home town, 5; Sentinel Butte, 9; Lehigh, 2; Glen Ullin, 5; Hebron, 3; Bel-field, 5.

#### FORT BERTHOLD BREAKS RECORDS

Land office records were broken by the registrations for homesteads on the Fort Berthold reservation, draw-

ings for which were begun yesterday. Drawings for fifty of the sixty homesteads were completed and the work will be finished today.

Three hundred thousand dollars were turned into the local land office by the homeseekers, as the one-fifth part of the purchase price of the homesteads required under the simultaneous filing laws. The filings closed Monday with 1,096 applications. The unsuccessful ones will have their money returned to them.


As many as seventy-five registrations were filed on one quarter section. Two hundred of those filing live in Minot.
