

AROUND THE STATE

Second-hand machinery is selling for more than the original cost at auction sales in various parts of the state. This is due to the fact that new machinery has increased in price the past year, and that it is possible for farmers, who had light crops this year, to buy their machinery on time.

Katie Meissner, a 15-year-old Hebron girl, has confessed to the setting of several fires and committing other depredations in her home town. The motive for the commission of these crimes is unknown. It is probable that the youthful offender will be sent to the state training school at Mandan.

The Carrington paper says: Only rocks have been hurled at the I. W. W. organization, so it may be no more than fair to make a record of about the only good thing the organization has done in this region. A representative from headquarters was here this week and gave checks for about \$400 to pay for the hospital and surgical expense of James Herald, the man shot through the intestines at Kensal a couple of weeks ago and who was brought to the Carrington hospital for treatment.

Hankering for a sight of the little old print shop that has been his meal ticket for 10 these many years, J. K. McLeod (Little Mac) left the St. Alexis hospital, on Monday, and returned to his home at Flasher, where he will temporarily superintend the issuing of the Hustler, the while he lays his plans for the winter. Mrs. McLeod was here over Sunday, and accompanied her husband on his homeward trip. Little Mac was a patient at St. Alexis for four weeks, and made himself so popular with everyone connected with that model institution—not forgetting the other patients—that they didn't want to let him go. But Mac got to feeling so

good that he just couldn't stay any longer, and he said he guessed he'd go back to Flasher and "Keep the Home Fires Burning"—for a spell.

A transient laborer, who had worked on the Ed. Smith farm in Wheaton township, near Antler, off and on during the past spring and summer, was found dead in the Smith barn this morning when Mr. Smith went to call him. The fellow stayed in Antler early in the spring, being apparently of a very quiet disposition, and rarely spoke to anyone. He told the Smiths that his name was Fred Dixon and spoke of coming here from Canada, but whether or not this is the case or whether he has any relatives remains to be determined.

The Schaefer Record man says: Speaking of hard luck, we certainly had our share of it the other day. We purchased 50 cents worth of potatoes and 40 cents worth of ham and went home to cook our own supper. After arriving at the house we took the ham out of our vest pocket and placed it on the kitchen cabinet. We then greased the frying pan with a quarter's worth of butter and went out to the car after the potatoes. There were no potatoes there, however. Some one had swiped both of them. And that isn't all about it. When we returned to the kitchen we made the discovery that a mouse had devoured the ham.

Sunday morning two colts belonging to A. M. Young of The Charbonneau Herald, wandered from the flats below the hill upon which reposes the home of the former editor, wandered down into the village just to see the sights, you know. Somebody entered a complaint. The cows were promptly pinched. Young says, "you may say for me, the law is O. K., and I paid the charges." The question that arises as one of justice. Milton Wilson, a member of Company K, and a son of Mr. and Mrs. Jess Wilson, whose home is about seven miles east of Ellendale, was accidentally shot last Sunday morning, while starting on a hunting trip. The entire charge of the gun entered the right arm just below the elbow, terribly lacerating the upper arm.

What is believed to be the first cablegram received in North Dakota from any soldier boy in the state was received Tuesday from C. R. Green of Cavalier, who wired his father from "Some Where in France," that he had arrived safely on the other side. Ronald Hazen, a son of Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Hazen of Larimore, and Mr. Green are members of the 30th Aerial Squad of the United States.

Ralph D. Heaton of the Heaton Lumber Co. of Dickinson had a narrow escape from death one day last week, when his car turned over in a ditch between Dickinson and Belfield. Mr. Heaton was thrown clear of the car, which immediately caught fire and was soon a twisted mass of junk. Mr. Heaton was stunned into insensibility and would have been burned with the car but for the fact that he was thrown some distance from the machine. A prairie fire was started by the burning car but the timely arrival of Senator McBride and some helpers prevented the fire from spreading.

R. J. Byrum of New Rockford has submitted to the war department board of ordinance and fortifications a plan which he has devised for the use of wireless electricity as a means of destructive warfare. Mr. Byrum's plan would be effective within a radius of ten miles, destroying, he claims, everything with which the current came in contact within that area. The war department has congratulated the Rockford man upon his patriotic interest and has been advised that his invention is being given careful consideration.

After escaping from officers in a spirited pursuit across country, in which he tied a deputy sheriff to a tree and drove off in the officer's car, Gordon Folkstead, wanted in Williams county on charges of stealing horses north of Buford, is now in a hospital at Sidney, Mont. Upon his recovery and after facing trial in Montana on an alleged wholesale horse stealing business in that state, he will be brought to North Dakota to face similar proceedings in the Williams county court.

C. C. Hodson is again possessor of his Ford car which was stolen in Grand Forks some time ago. Sheriff Turner returned from Omaha, Neb., last Tuesday, where he went to arrest C. J. Brooks who stole C. C. Hodson's Ford some time ago. Mr. Turner made the thief drive the car back. The return trip was made in two and one-half days and Mr. Hodson again has the Ford in his possession. The car was discovered as being the stolen car from Grand Forks, N. D., in Omaha, Neb., as Brooks had no license numbers on the car when arrested.

There is being a regular roundup of criminals at Hazen in Mercer county and it is expected that no fewer than fifteen arrests will be made before the state and federal authorities finish their work. Dan Brennan, Rev. F. L. Watkins, States Attorney H. L. Berry, Miss Grace Britton, and one detective going under the name of Ed. Edwards, dropped into Hazen last week and started doing things in an effort to clean up the illicit traffic in booze in that county. Charles Ellsworth is now under \$1,000 bonds and Sheriff Haevischer is slated for removal from office. Even the pro-Ge-

mans are scheduled to come into the investigation as it is said these officials are working in conjunction with the federal officials. In another week many more developments may transpire and it is predicted that there will be a general clean up in Mercer county which will doubtless suppress any other ever effected within the state.

Paul J. Ballietto committed suicide at his home three miles southwest of Watford about noon Friday by shooting himself in the right temple with

a .32 caliber revolver. The body was found by Mrs. Ballietto who had returned from a journey to Watford within a few minutes after her husband had taken his life. Mr. Ballietto had been worrying for some time over the war, and since the demonstration given at Watford for the men who enlisted for Camp Dodge Wednesday he has been worse. It was not suspected, however, that he contemplated suicide. Coroner Hinman was called from Alexander. An investigation disclosed that deceased's mind was un-

balanced and no inquest was necessary. Mr. Ballietto left a note addressed to his wife, sticking in a god wall near his body. The opening statement in the note was: "I am doing what I think best." The note then referred to something he had told his wife relative to the government seizing his property and forcing him to fight in the trenches. Then followed instructions as to the disposal of his property and the settlement of all his debts. He leaves a wife and four children.
