38,000,000 MEN FIGHTING.
Washington officials estimate that at least 38,000,000 men are bearing arms in the great world war, 27,500,000 on the side of the allies and 10,500,000 on the side of the Central powers.
Against Germany's 7,000,000, Austria's 3,000,000, Turkey's 3,000,000 and Bulgaria's 2,000,000 are arrayed the following armed forces:
Russia, 9,000,000; France, 6,000,000; Great Britain, 5,000,000; Italy, 3,000,000; Japan, 1,400,000; United States, more than 1,000,000; China, 541,000; Roumania, 320,000; Serbia, 300,000; Belgium, 300,000; Greece, 300,000; Portugal, 200,000; Montenegro, 40,000; Siam, 36,000; Cuba, 11,000, and Liberia, 400. San Marino and Panama also have small forces under arms.

Attorney and Mrs. Johnson Will Occupy Their New Home

They located on the homestead in the early eighties, long before Minot was even on the map. They both worked hard and prospered and will now come to Minot to reside. For many years Mr. Johnson has maintained law offices in this city and for several years has occupied the old Bank of Minot building at the corner of Main street and Second avenue and during the pleasant weather made daily trips back and forth to his home on the farm.

L. P. WEATHERWAX TELLS ABOUT APPLE GROWING
Mr. and Mrs. L. P. Weatherwax, who have been visiting with their children in Minot and Des Laes, will return to their home at Nampa, Ida., the latter part of the week.
The Independent enjoyed a visit with the former Ward county treasurer, who appears as though Idaho is agreeing with him. Mr. Weatherwax set out an apple orchard eight years ago and this year he picked 2200 boxes of apples and will pick about 400 boxes more of the late varieties on his return.
"I like the fruit growing business fine," Mr. Weatherwax said. "Of course there is lots of bother for I had to spray my apples three times and this took some work and labor is scarce. But there is good money in fruit growing. We have a few peach trees and when I left home there were late peaches on the trees and bushels of them rotting on the ground."
Mr. Weatherwax said that Idaho grew big crops this year. The best crop of wheat averaged 65 bushels per acre and some fields of alfalfa produced \$90 worth of the feed to the acre.

WISCONSIN SENATOR SHOT BY BROTHER
U. S. Senator Hustung of Wisconsin was shot and killed by his brother Sunday afternoon while hunting ducks at Rush Lake, Wis.
