CHAIRMAN ROHE ON FEED BUYING TRIP

Chairman of the Board of Commissioners in Twin Cities—Will Buy Feed Oats and Ship Them Out Immediately.

J. M. Rohe, chairman of the board of county commissioners, left Monday night for the Twin Cities, where he will purchase a large quantity of feed oats and ship them immediately to the most central points in the county for distribution amongst the farmers who are without feed to put their horses in condition for the spring work.

The seed grain matter will be attended to a little later, and it is hoped by the county commissioners that a sufficient supply of the feed and the different seed grains may be purchased and on hand when needed, so that every farmer may be supplied.

The past winter has been an unusually hard one on horses, especially with those farmers who have been short of feed grains, and the commissioners are aware of the fact that if the horses are to be in any shape to withstand the work of the spring season, immediate steps must be taken to put them in condition. Mr. Rohe will buy the feed, arrange for the cars to ship it in, and see that it is actually on its way to Ward county before leaving the Twin Cities.


After a careful survey of the situation, the commissioners have decided that the following amounts of the different grains will be needed in Ward county:

- Feed, 120,000 bushels.
- Seed oats, 45,000 bushels.
- Seed barley, 13,000 bushels.
- Seed wheat, 24,000 bushels.

Application blanks are now in the hands of the various banks of the county and farmers who will need feed or seed grain are urged to sign the applications at once, so that there may be no delay, as the applications must be passed upon by the commissioners before the grain is delivered.

The commissioners have decided that owing to the poor condition of the corn in the east, they will not attempt to buy it for feed, but will rely on oats entirely. Considerable trouble has been experienced where corn has been shipped in the corn heating. A little barley may be bought, in fact one carload of this grain is already on hand for emergency use.

The feed and seed grain will be stored in elevators at the following points: Minot, Logan, Des Lacs, Berthold, Lone Tree, Deering, Glenburn, Plaza, Makoti, Ryder, Douglas, Max, Benedict, Kenmare, Donnybrook, Carpio, Foxholm, Burlington and Sawyer. In order to give special emphasis to the importance of prompt action, we again urge the farmers, at Mr. Rohe's request, to get busy and sign

SEED CORN SCARCE AND HIGH

Geo. E. Valke Returns From Chicago With Report That Seed Dealers Can Get \$15 Spot Cash For Seed Corn

George E. Valke, Minot's florist and seed dealer, has returned from Chicago where he went to look up the seed situation. He found a great scarcity of seed corn, and peas and beans for seed.

"It is a good thing that I made the trip to Chicago, otherwise I would not have received any seed corn at all. As it was, I will receive only a small part of what I ordered months ago, and all seed dealers will have to content themselves with getting a small share. Seed corn was simply not produced this year. The corn crop in Illinois and Iowa last year appeared to be the best in the history of those states, but a frost came and destroyed nearly all of it. The seed house where I visited has 200 girls at work, hand picking the kernels of seed corn, getting two or three quarts of good seed out of a bushel. Chicago seed dealers can get \$15.00 a bushel spot cash for their good seed and I look for it to be retailing for \$25 a bushel in some distances.
