

NORWICH WOMAN CALLED BY HER MASTER

Mrs. J. W. Buettner, After Lingering Illness, Answers Summons Feb. 24.

Mrs. J. W. Buettner, wife of a well known Norwich businessman, passed away at her home Feb. 24, following a long illness, from which she had been a patient sufferer for years. The remains were interred at Norwich, the Rev. Irl Pounds of Sawyer, N. D., preaching the funeral sermon. He

chose for his text: St. John 11:25. The pall bearers were members of Local No. 11 of the Mechanics' Mutual Benefit Association of North Dakota, the husband of the deceased being a past president of that state organization.

Mrs. Buettner was born Jan. 12, 1845, in St. Lawrence county, N. Y., where she grew to womanhood. While a resident of that state she was united in marriage to John Cole and to them were born five children, three sons and two daughters. The sons all died in infancy. The daughters, Mrs. O. G. Knudson of Sanish, N. D., and Mrs.

E. C. Varble of Hessian, Wash., survive.

On Sept. 26, 1906, she was united in marriage to J. W. Buettner of Norwich.

Mrs. Buettner was 73 years, one month and twelve days old at the time of her death. She had lived a long and useful life and was a true helpmate to her husband. Her home was to her the dearest place on earth. She was a good, consistent Christian woman and bore her suffering with a noble God-fearing spirit. Her last words were that she was ready to cross to the other shore to meet her Savior.
