





Above illustration shows single rod size, satin brass finish



MANY MINOT FRIENDS ATTEND WM. WEST FUNERAL

Fitting Ceremonies Held Oct. 6 at Old Home, Barnesville, Minn., Where Parents of Deceased Reside.

The funeral of Wm. West, well known G. N. engineer, who died recently on a train at Fergus Falls, Minn., while enroute to Minneapolis for medical treatment, was held at Barnesville, Minn., the old home, Sunday, Oct. 6. The remains were taken from the home of the parents of the deceased to the church which could not accommodate the large crowd of friends gathered to pay their last tribute of love and respect to this excellent citizen. The ministers of Barnesville all being ill, it was necessary to secure the services of a minister from Fergus Falls. The floral tributes were very profuse, the Knights of Pythias lodge of Minot, of which Mr. West was a member, contributing a beautiful wreath.

Mr. West, in his youth, resided in Barnesville. His parents are among the most highly respected people of Barnesville. His father is an old time engineer and for years was locomotive fireman in that city.

A large number of Minot friends attended the funeral, among whom were: Mr. and Mrs. Pat Doyle, Engineer Richardson, Mr. and Mrs. Compton, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Johnson, Roy Pierce, Fred Almy, Judge Wm. Murray, Engineer Greenhalgh, and Engineer Murray.

John K. Sveen writes from New York The Independent has received a very interesting letter from John K. Sveen, a Minot businessman for years, who is now residing in New York city. Mr. Sveen is one of the National trustees of the Sons of Norway and is evidently doing some very effective work for the Fourth Liberty Loan in New York city. He says in part:

"Everything is in good shape, good news from the front, in fact we still have some German propaganda here that will make use of this rosy outlook for peace against our 4th Liberty Loan drive.

"Every fraternity, every society and club is working and urging in this loan-drive. We shall not deny that there is a little nervousness in the air over the outcome of this subscription-drive. Eighteen Hundred Millions, which is the quota for New York, is a tremendous amount of money.

"The Norwegians in Brooklyn and New York have organized themselves with an executive committee and are working day and night. Every rationality has organized in a similar manner and everybody is being approached.

"I have this week been on the go four nights on Staten Island and in Brooklyn, speaking for various organizations and societies. Saturday I have a date for the Bronx, Sunday afternoon and Monday night in Brooklyn. Had the pleasure the other night to see \$4,000.00 of small denominations sold right after I was through speaking.

"My congratulations for your good work in Minot—you certainly surpass-

sed the East with your quick work in spite of failures and hardships. "With kindest regards, Yours, "JOHN K. SVEEN."

Kenneth Foster Victim of the Influenza.

Kenneth, the 10-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Foster of this city, died Sunday night after a short illness with the Spanish influenza, which resulted in pneumonia. Kenneth was a fine, manly little lad and exceedingly popular with all with whom he came in contact.

Kenneth fell and hurt his hip Wednesday of last week and the doctor was called the following day. He grew rapidly worse and it is believed that he became the victim of the influenza. He passed away Sunday afternoon at 5:15 o'clock.

The funeral was held from the home Sunday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock. Rev. P. W. Erickson preaching words of comfort. The remains were interred in Rose Hill Cemetery.

Kenneth is survived by his parents, and two brothers and four sisters, who have the sympathy of all. The father is a member of the well known plumbing firm of Foster & Connolly.

L. W. Toftner Independent Candidate for Commissioner.

County Will Meet Seed Bonding Obligations.

County Commissioner Lokensgard informs the Independent that the money from the seed liens is coming in quite satisfactorily, and he believes that the county will collect enough this year to pay the \$50,000 due, besides the interest on the bonds. The county bonded for \$250,000 to furnish seed and feed for the farmers and a fifth of this amount with the interest is to be paid back each year.
