### BRIEF STATE NEWS

Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Hoch of Deering received the sad news that their son, Henry was killed in action. The county commissioners passed a resolution Wednesday making it law for stock to run at large in Renville county.

Henry Koch, of Deering was recent-

ly killed in action in France. He was twenty-four years old, and had resided in Deering for many years.

There were eight deaths during the past week at Hazelton, and among them former representative Batzer, who was ill but a short time.

Mrs. Fred Berndt, of Balfour, has received word that her husband, who was wounded in France, has been sent

back to Washington and is recovering nicely.

J. W. H. Fisher, who has served the First State Bank of Balfour for the past eight years, will go to Musselshell, Montana, where he and J. G. Ritsch will open a bank.

Rev. N. H. Holm, Norwegian Lutheran minister of Ryder, died at his home in that city last Friday, his death resulting from heart trouble. The funeral was held Monday.

An even eleven inches of rainfall was recorded at the state observatory on the Thomas McCreary farm for the growing season of 1918, from April to November 1.

Kenneth Willis of Mound, near Mar-marth, who was wounded by the accidental discharge of a gun and later taken to Miles City for an operation succumbed shortly after the operation was performed.

Thomas J. Schaefer, aged 44 years, whose remains were taken to Killdeer for interment last week following his death at Dickinson, passed away following an operation for blood poisoning caused by an ulcerated tooth.

Mrs. John Buechler, who resides in Montana passed away at the home of her brother near Beulah, last week, where she had been called to attend the funeral of another brother, John J. Becker. She was a former resident of the Zap vicinity.

Daily papers contain a report of the death of Major F. L. Schumann, which occurred in France, about October 20th. Mr. Schumann was for many years district manager of the North Dakota Independent Telephone Co.

Gunder Ligaard of Fortuna, while rounding up some cattle Sunday met with a very bad accident. The horse he was riding slipped and fell, throwing its rider to the ground with such force that it broke his collar bone. Mr. Ligaard was taken to the Ambrose hospital.

In accordance with its promise to relieve the sugar allowance situation thruout the country at the earliest possible opportunity the United States Food Administration has beginning November 1, increased the monthly household allowance from two to three pounds per person.

Miss Florence Saddler of Amidon,

was quite badly injured and three other occupants of the car were somewhat bruised and hurt when a Ford driven by Stewart Lockwood, the grasshopperman, turned turtle on a sandy road near Amidon. Fortunately the car was being driven at a slow rate of speed.

The granary on the Oscar T. Erickson farm near Voltaire, was totally destroyed by fire on Monday of this week. Five hundred bushels of oats and one hundred bushels of rye together with minor losses are reported, with partial insurance to cover the loss. The origin of the fire is unknown.

Chris Heer, proprietor of the pioneer store at Martin, Sheridan county, must contribute \$750 to the United War Work Campaign fund, as a result of his admission before Dr. E. F. Ladd, Federal food administrator, in Fargo, Wednesday that he sold flour in large quantities without the required substitutes. Dr. Ladd warned Heer that he must abide by the regulations in the future, or have his store closed for the duration of the war.

Lieut. Col. G. C. Grafton of Fargo and Col. J. H. Fraine, of Grafton, who have served together in the North Dakota militia, the Philippines, and in the world war over 30 years, have been separated by an order that divides their command, according to word received in Fargo from Col. Grafton. The officers went to France in command of the 164th infantry, formerly the First North Dakota.

Kate Richards O'Hare, socialist woman worker, must serve five years in the federal prison for violation of the espionage act. An address made at Bowman, this state, was responsible for her conviction. M. A. Hildreth, U. S. district attorney, received word Wednesday that the United States circuit court of appeals had confirmed the district court conviction and sentence.

The consolidation of the two depots in Lansford was effected this week. Agent G. R. Geeslin of the Soo Line moved his outfit to the Great Northern station at the crossing, which will henceforth be known by the more euphonious and high sounding name of "Union Depot". Mr. Geeslin was checked in as agent for the two roads, a fact that is very gratifying to the people here generally. Agent W. W. Wilson, who has been in charge of the G. N. station temporarily, returns to his duties at the York depot.

Rate concessions on lignite coal, which will save North Dakota from 30 to 40 cents a ton, or a total of \$200,000 to \$400,000 on this year's coal bill were announced by the federal railway administration to take effect as soon as tariffs can be published, probably by the middle of the month. The action is a result of an insistent campaign made by the state railway commission. The rates to Minnesota and South Dakota are reduced to permit the use of lignite as far as the twin cities.

There were only three offices in Renville county over which there was a contest. Geo. Scofield was elected sheriff, L. M. Rockne, county superintendent, and Walter Martine register of deeds. County Auditor Carlson, County Treasurer Berg and County Judge Crewe were re-elected without opposition. Dr. E. S. Fitzmaurice was elected coroner, and Edmund White, county surveyor. States Attorney Bryans was also re-elected without opposition. G. Patterson easily won out for representative.

This week it is reported that A. J. Miller has disposed of his fine farm of a section and a half, three miles south of Minto. A half section was sold to F. C. Riski, the consideration being \$20,800.00, the remaining full section was sold to John GreEVER and the purchase price was \$50,000.00. There were three sets of fairly good buildings on the farm, and the place is considered one of the really choice farms in this locality and well worth the nice round figure at which it was sold.

Members of the Demores section crew were all more or less injured recently when No. 3 struck the motor car on the track between Demores and Sentinel Butte. The train was rounding a curve and was close upon them before they were aware of the danger. In trying to remove the car from the rails there was some confusion and as a result the pilot hit the car and flying pieces struck the section men. J. H. Frame was seriously injured and is now in the Glendive hospital and his recovery is doubtful. Anton Winger and J. Johnson were also painfully injured but are recovering.
