Early Settlers Recall Days When Deer Lived in Mouse River Woods

J. N. Johnson, one of the pioneer farmers of Ward county, related some incidents of the early days that are very interesting. Mr. Johnson resides on a farm of nearly 300 acres in the Mouse river valley two miles west of Minot. He has lived continuously on this place since 1886 and there is probably but one farmer in this district who has continued to live on his land for a longer period. He is Mr. Johnson's neighbor, Peter E. Peterson, who settled on his farm two years prior, or in 1884. This is the same year that John Wallin settled on his homestead up the river.
Mr. Johnson says that in those days no one lived on the prairie. If one wanted to meet another man on the prairie, it proved to be quite a surprise for each. There were plenty of deer in the woods along Mouse river in those days and many of the settlers shot one whenever they wanted a little venison. The deer would come to the water holes in Mouse river, which were cut by the settlers for their cows. The buffalo had all disappeared by the time Mr. Johnson came here, but their bones lay scattered everywhere over the prairie. He says for many years after that he could see the tracks of the buffalo in the soft ground about the springs where they would come for water. The buffalo had been killed by the Indians and white hunters, who killed them for their hides. Buffalo coats were so cheap in those days that the best coats could be bought for \$25 to \$35. Now they cannot be bought for any price.
