### FOXHOLM FARMERS FIGHT THE GRASSHOPPERS

3,100 Pounds of Poisoned Bran Scattered in Fields of St. Mary's and Foxholm Townships.

Grasshoppers are getting in their work in St. Mary's township near Foxholm and farmers have banded together to fight the pests this week. It is believed that much of the damage will be averted by this concerted action.

T. L. Simmons noticed the small grasshoppers at work in an 80 acre field of wheat on his farm a week ago Wednesday. He came to Minot, sought the aid of the county agricultural agent, and took back 2,300 pounds of the poisoned bran to be used by the farmers in the township. This was scattered along the edge of the fields and when the grasshoppers started to enter the fields, they met their Waterloo. There are dead grasshoppers by the millions at the edge of the wheat fields in Foxholm township. Mr. Simmons came to Minot again Monday and took a thousand pounds more poisoned bran with him to be used by the farmers in Foxholm township where damage is also reported. In this township Wm. Zininger reports an 80-acre field of wheat entirely eaten off.

The poisoned bran is a part of that furnished by the county in its campaign on the grasshoppers. Mr. Simmons turned over a portion of the poison to the following, who reported the presence of grasshoppers on their farms in large numbers:

C. J. Brennan, Wm. Bock, A. Reihle, Joe Heinen, John Heinen, J. Schultz, Mike Stammen, Wm. Souder, Fred Gorde, Jim Keough, Chas. Higgins, Frank Kramer, Martin Nelson, F. Schmidt and Jack McKone.

Joe Eckhardt and Jake Fuchs each reports a patch of four or five acres of the wheat eaten off, but the wheat came up again and is now about as far along as the rest of the field.

All over the county the voters are signing petitions asking for county aid in the fight on the pests. The \$1,500 appropriation made by the county commissioners last week is merely a starter, it is predicted. The grasshoppers must be eradicated this year or they will not only ruin thousands of acres of crops, but they will be here to lay their eggs and damage us again next year.

Mr. Simmons stated that he believes the poisoned bran is doing effective work. Wherever it has been used, it has stopped the progress of the pests.

### FOOTHILLS MAN COMMITS SUICIDE

Bowbells, N. D., June 11.—The funeral of Pete Grening, who shot and killed himself at his home in Foothills township at ten o'clock last week, was held at the Foothills Lutheran church on Friday last week at two o'clock in the afternoon. Mr. Grening suffered a severe attack of the flu during the fore part of April, and never had been well since that time. After his illness and after he had gained sufficient strength, he went to Minot and there for several weeks was treated by doctors, which treatments seemed to have improved his health to some extent. Several days before his death he appeared almost normal. He attended a meeting of members of the ladies aid the Sunday before his death, and seeded grain in his fields on Tuesday. Wednesday morning he told his wife that he did not feel well, and did not get up. His wife had an idea that his mind was not right so watched him very closely, and stayed with him almost constantly. She got the mail at 10 o'clock in the forenoon and gave it to him, and then went into another room for a few minutes. During her absence he got out of bed, secured a revolver from a dresser drawer, and shot himself through the head. The bullet passed through the skull on one side, and was stopped by the skull on the opposite side. He lived about two hours after the bullet was fired. Mr. Grening was about 40 years old, married, and came here 17 years ago with his wife from Norway. The couple never had any children. He took a homestead in Foothills township, and by hard work and good management accumulated quite a lot of the world's goods. About seven years ago he went to Canada where he took up another homestead, and after proving that up, returned to Foothills township two years ago. At the time of his death he owned a section of land in Foothills township and a half section of land in Canada. He is survived by his wife, two brothers, and his mother-in-law, who had been making her home with him.


