BRIEF STATE NEWS

The home of Mrs. Patrick Noonan in Divide county was destroyed by fire one night last week.

Tire thieves looted the garage at Plaza one night last week, securing a large amount of auto accessories.

A passenger air service is planned for the near future between Fargo and Grand Forks by North Dakota fliers.

The Hungry Man's Lunch Room at Grand Forks, owned by A. L. Hillsback, and an adjoining pool hall, were robbed of \$54 in cash recently.

Ralph Johnstone and Roy D. Hand of Stanley were lodged in the city jail at Mondak, Mont., as a result of having been suspected of stealing an automobile.

T. E. Hayward, popular Beach banker, was elected treasurer of the North Dakota Bankers' association at their meeting and picnic recently held at Detroit, Minn.

Roy Johnston, 20 years old, working his way west on a freight train, from Chicago, missed his hold while attempting to board a train at Hebron and as a result lost one of his legs.

Elmer Stoops is held in the Slope county jail charged with forgery. He found Ole Johnson's check book and signed several thousand dollars worth of checks in payment for some cattle.

Fred Dubeau gets six years in the pen, for a vicious attack on a Belvidere woman. He wanted to marry her at first and when she refused him, he threw her out of an auto and ran over her, leaving her lying on the roadside.

Little Caroline Simpson, Grand Forks, was killed last Friday. While standing in front of St. Mary's Catholic church, one of the heavy vases standing in front of the building fell upon her. She was buried last Friday.

Alphonso Williams pleaded guilty to a charge of manslaughter before Judge Crawford at Amidon last week. Williams killed Charles Grey at Marmoth last month while the two were beating their way thru from Chicago. They were both colored.

Ole Boyun, a former resident and homesteader in Ward county, died recently at his home in Sun Prairie, Wis. Mr. Boyun at one time resided near Epworth, where he proved up a farm. He was well known and highly regarded while living in North Dakota.

The homecoming held for the soldier boys at Velva last Friday, day and night, was a grand success. Outsiders as well as home folks were royally entertained. The city was decorated in fine style and the different committees on entertainment deserve no little credit for their good management.

Dr. E. F. Robinson of Chicago was killed, Dr. J. W. Bowen of Dickinson, N. D., was probably fatally injured and William Kobleky of Dickinson was seriously hurt when a motor car ran off a bridge near Kaycee, Wyo., early last Friday. The party was on the way from Sheridan to Casper to attend a meeting of the directors of an oil company.

Several thousand acres of land in Kidder and Stutsman county have been leased by John D. Loh of Dickinson for the farmers of the drought stricken districts of the west. Cattle will be shipped to this hay land. In addition, much hay will be secured for shipment into the drought district. Mr. Loh is representing the citizens' committee formed recently in Dickinson to take action on the situation.

The annual convention of the exclusive retail dealers of North Dakota will be held in Bismarck on August 11 and 12, according to S. F. Bergeson, president of the organization. Mr. Bergeson is working out the program for the association, which will include discussions of interest to the fifty or more members. Among the topics to be discussed will be credits, collections, transportation difficulties, discounts, etc.

George A. Totten, Jr., son of Rev. George Totten of the board of regents, and who was chief clerk of the last house of representatives, has resigned his post with the league press bureau and has become affiliated with former Representative Portey J. Kimball of Cass county in the coal mining operations of the Federal Development company, a corporation in which Kimball formerly was associated with Thomas Allen Box and Jack Hastings.

The Cavalier Chronicle has been sold by Editor Thompson to a company of farmers, or in other words, the Nonpartisan league has obtained control of it and is importing an editor from Wahpeton by the name of Kelly. Mr. Thompson, who owned the paper but a short time, buying it from Editor Fairchild, has made no announcements of his future plans, but it is likely he will remain in the city. Salesmen are in the field selling stock in the new company.

George P. Moeller of Hettinger marketed eight Duroc Jersey grade pigs last week upon which he made a fine profit. He bought the pigs at the John Monroe sale the last of March, just at weaning time, and he paid \$68.50 for the lot. He sold them last week for \$268.50 or at an increase, over a period of a little over three months, of \$200. He says this emphasizes the fact that it pays to have well bred pigs and to feed them well by way of finishing them off quickly.

A paving project, including 11 city blocks, will be carried to completion this year at Wahpeton, the contract for the work being awarded to Hanlon & Okes of Minneapolis. Bitulithic pavement will be laid. Third street will be paved from the Great Northern to Oakes avenue and the avenues will be paved a half block each way off Third street. Some opposition developed but a majority of the property owners demanded that the work be done. The contract calls for completion of the job by October 15.

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
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
