WILL CONVERT CAPITAL GROUNDS INTO A BEAUTIFUL PARK

Bismarck, N. D.—A permanent plan of parking for the 160 acres which form the Capitol grounds is being worked out by Arthur R. Nichols of the Twin City landscape architect firm of Morell & Nichols. This work is being done as a preliminary to the erection on a site to be determined by the general plan of the grounds of a \$200,000 history building as a memorial to the 30,000 North Dakota soldiers, sailors and marines who served during the world war. Mr. Nichols was brought to Bismarck the fore part of the week by the board of control acting under directions from the special committee which has in hand the building of the new history hall. In appropriating \$200,000 for the new structure, the last assembly directed that the state house grounds be landscaped, and that there be laid out in connection with the building a ten-acre park to be dedicated to North Dakota's veterans of the world war. It is probable that the new building will be erected slightly to the south and east of the state house proper, just beyond the point where the statue of Sakakawea now stands. This would afford a commanding location which at the same time would make the building convenient to the capitol.

NEW BOARD OF ADMINISTRATION APPOINTED

Bismarck, N. D.—The new board of administration has been appointed by Governor Frazier. Aside from naming three men for this position, vacancies in three district judgeships were filled. The short term on the administration board, lasting until July 1, 1921, is filled by P. M. Casey, president of the Equity Packing company of Fargo. Robert Muir of Searles will serve on the board until 1923, and George M. Totten of Bowman until 1925. The latter two have served on the board of regents. Emerson Smith of Fargo, Geo. Moelring of Ray and R. Goer of Devils Lake are three attorneys appointed to the state bar. League newspapers also forecast the appointment of John H. Worst, former president of the North Dakota agricultural college, to the position of state immigration commissioner. The position has been offered Worst, but it is understood here that he has declined. He recently was elected president emeritus of the state agricultural college.

HOGS WILL FATTEN ON SHORT WHEAT

Bismarck, N. D.—Although his crops are a complete failure so far as ability to harvest them by ordinary means is concerned, G. M. Christianson of Belfield expects to clear \$5,000 this year by utilizing his hundred-odd porkers as harvesters. "The wheat heads are well filled out, and there is a comparatively heavy yield of grain," said Mr. Christianson today, "but the straw is so short that no known means of harvesting the crop has worked. I solved the difficulty this morning by turning over a hundred head of young hogs into my wheat fields. They'll get every grain of the wheat, and it will bring more marketed in the form of pork than it would in its original shape." In addition to hogs, Mr. Christianson has a nice herd of Herefords and countless hundreds of turkeys, geese, ducks and chickens. Mrs. Christianson looks after the poultry end of the business, which has become a source of big profits.

GRAIN BUYERS MUST OBSERVE NEW LAW

Bismarck, N. D.—Fifty-three North Dakota state's attorneys were notified by Attorney General William Langer that he will expect them to throw into jail any elevator agent, grain buyer or other individual who seems to evade or violate the provisions of Senate bill 14, which establishes state standards of grain grades, weights and measures. The attorney general advised the states attorneys that he would hold them strictly accountable for the enforcement of both the civil and criminal phases of Senate bill 14, and that he would expect them to enforce the law and jail sentences as prescribed by law for any person or corporation seeking to evade the provisions of this act in dockage, grading, weighing or measuring of grain, or by violating any of the rules promulgated under the terms of the act. The attorney general's order is one of the most drastic and sweeping ever issued from his department.

GRANO POSTMASTER, OLD SOLDIER, DIES

Grano, N. D.—William D. Safford, 86, veteran of the Civil War and pioneer resident of this community, died at the home of his son, W. D. Safford, in this village, after a brief illness. Mr. Safford has been postmaster here for many years and was one of the conspicuous figures of the community. Two years ago on the occasion of his fiftieth wedding anniversary, a large golden wedding party was held in honor of him and his wife, and they were presented with a purse of gold with which to take a trip. The old couple took an extended trip to New York City and other points of interest. Mr. Safford was always conspicuously identified with the G. A. R.

KELLY FARM TO BRING BIG SUM

Devils Lake Land Man Goes to Chicago to Complete \$225,000 Deal. Col. Joseph M. Kelly, Devils Lake banker and president of the Farmers' railroad and J. E. Streeter, head of the Streeter Land and Loan corporation, also of Devils Lake, spent a short time in the city last evening en route to Chicago and Southern Indiana, where they expect to complete the sale of the 2,500-acre farm owned by John Kelly. The land is located near Bisbee, N. D., and the consideration is said to be approximately \$225,000. The transaction is practically complete, according to Mr. Streeter, and the sale is one of the largest made this spring through his offices.
