**PLUMBING ORDINANCE PASSED AT SECOND READING**

Anyone Who Considers Himself a Plumber Can Undertake Any Work in the City Without a License.

The new plumbing ordinance was passed at its second and final reading at Monday night's meeting of the city commission. Shaft, Malm and Bowker voted for the ordinance and Housholder and President Shaw voted against it.

Hereafter, Minot plumbers will not be licensed. Anyone who considers himself a plumber will be permitted to undertake any kind of plumbing work.

The new ordinance created quite a furor among the local plumbing concerns and others, the city being somewhat divided as to the relative merits of the ordinance.


