BISMARCK TRIBUNE SUFFERS HEAVY FIRE DAMAGE

The Bismarck Tribune was damaged by fire which started from some mysterious cause in the waste paper room one day last week. The loss, while serious, was fairly well covered by insurance. The job department was not badly damaged by fire but was water soaked. At first it was feared that there might be trouble in collecting their insurance as the company had just moved into new quarters and it was feared that all of the insurance had not been transferred.

VALUE OF PUREBRED BULLS.

The first cross of a purebred bull on the average dairy herd increases the income \$32 per cow. These figures were secured in the province of Ontario in a comparison of 140 herds using grade bulls and 31 using purebreds. Mr. Rex E. Willard, of the Farm Management Department of the North Dakota Agricultural College, in applying these figures to North Dakota, shows that one farmer with 20 cows using grade bulls received an income of \$1680, his neighbor with 20 cows, but who began using purebred bulls 5 years ago should receive \$2320 or \$540 more.

Burlington Cow Earns \$2.00 Per Day.

O. K. Spires, while in the city attending the meeting of the Ward county Guernsey Breeders' Association informed a representative that he has one cow which has produced \$118 worth of milk during the past 59 days. Mr. Spires keeps an accurate record of each cow's products as well as a complete account of the feed consumed and assures us that the dairy cow is the best investment a farmer can make. Notwithstanding the fact that Mr. Spires was offered some \$300 for the animal mentioned he could not see his way clear to part with her.


How Sherman Meets the H. C. L.

Johnny King, formerly postmaster at Donnybrook, was in the city the first of the week calling upon old friends.


