**COMMITTEE VISITS GOVERNOR IN
ATTEMPT TO KEEP PRES. CRANE**

F. C. Upton, Henry M. Wilson, Anthony Walton, N. D. Gorman, A. M. Christensen and E. A. Shirley, a committee of Minot citizens, sent to Bismarck last Friday to confer with Governor Frazier to devise ways and means of retaining the services of President A. G. Crane of the Minot Normal school, have returned. The committee spent more than an hour with the Governor, who explained that while the services of Mr. Crane were fully appreciated, the Board of Regents did not consider the state able to pay a larger salary to the president of the Minot Normal than that paid to the presidents of several other institutions no larger than their own.

The committee sounded out the Governor as to what the attitude of the Board of Regents might be for placing Mr. Crane in the position of President of the North Dakota State Agricultural College in the event that the present incumbent, Dr. Ladd, is elected to the United States Senate. The Governor would not commit himself, except to state that the election of Dr. Ladd was not absolutely certain and that there might be a change in the personnel of at least two members of the Board of Regents.

These men appeared before the Governor as friends of Mr. Crane, representing his many admirers in the state, who felt that his services in North Dakota should not be lost without an effort on their part.

Two Days' Rain Benefits Plowing
A two days' steady rain, Sunday and Monday, resulted in a precipitation of 1.1 inches of moisture, which will prove of great benefit to the farmers who want to get some fall plowing done. The ground had been very dry, owing to the hot winds of the last week, but is now in perfect condition for plowing.

The rain came too late to help the potatoes much. The potato crop, while very fair, was cut down about 25 per cent by the dry, hot weather during the latter part of August. The price is apt to keep around \$2.00 a bushel, which will make the crop very profitable.

Most of the wheat cutting has been finished. Jos. Linnertz, northwest of the city, has about 100 acres of wheat to cut and there are a few scattering fields, but the work will all be completed by the last of the week if the weather remains favorable.

We are getting a limited supply of Hard Coal now, but can make no promise for the future.




