NORTH DAKOTA NEWS

Geo. Williams, Sr., of Westhope, died from blood poison Sept. 9th after a week's illness.

The two-year-old son of Roy Ladd of near Tolley fell into a farm reservoir last week and was drowned.

Two whiskey runners were captured near Glen Ewen by Canadian officials Sunday night, several shots being fired.

North Dakota Bankers Association has declared war on burglars and offers large rewards for their capture dead or alive.

The census bureau gives Ward county 28,811 inhabitants, an increase of 3,530 in ten years. Donnybrook is given 267 against 237 in 1910.

A motion picture will be shown in ten days in district court at Washburn asking for a new trial for Henry Lyster, self-confessed slayer of eight people at Turtle Lake last April.

T. J. Hocking, who owned and published the Antler American quite a number of years ago and who has been publishing the Glasgow, Mont., Courier for several years, was recently chosen president of the Montana Press Association.

The Devils Lake World has been sold again, this time by the former owner, Mr. Miller, who has had possession a little over two months, to a company of farmer stockholders of Ramsey county. The new management states that the paper will be "independent" in its politics, without any partisan bias. We shall watch with interest for the fitting development of its "independence," and wish for the paper much deserved prosperity.

Two fellows from Canada went to Spanish one day last week with booze. They planted the cargo along the river somewhere and went into town to take orders. In the meantime some harvest hands heard about the deposit up the river and started out to investigate and discovered the carefully hidden bottles in a cluster of bushes. When it came time for the peddlers to deliver the goods they very carefully sought their retreat only to find that every doggone bottle had disappeared.

The September 1st government crop report places the 1920 North Dakota wheat crop at 79,574,000 bushels compared with 53,613,000 last year and the five year average 85,912,000 bushels. The report says the state production of corn and potatoes is below the average, due to the hot dry weather in August. The hot weather was what the corn in this territory needed, and much of it has not been frosted and is a good crop.

Wm. Larson and son Kenneth of Donnybrook were struck by lightning while on a load of hay last Friday. Both were knocked down and stunned. When Mr. Larson got up the team had started to run but he still held onto the lines and got the horses stopped. The boy was still down but recovered quickly. Mr. Larson found that a button on his cap was shattered by the stroke and the boy said he had seen a flash as of fire on his father's head when the lightning struck. It was a narrow escape from serious injury.

J. W. Erinton and C. M. Brinton of Fessenden, claim to own 999 shares of the 1,000 in the Burleigh County Farmers Press, the newspaper plant now in dispute between the league and the "traitors." It is said farmers of Burleigh county paid \$13,000 and supposed they owned the newspaper. The state home building department is charged with having a payroll in the office of \$2,000 a month, enough to make an overhead cost on every building put up of \$1,000.

Secretary of State Thomas Hall has received official notification from Washington of the passage of the equal suffrage amendment. Women will vote on all offices in North Dakota this fall without further legislation.

John Read, a twelve year old Haynes boy, was dangerously wounded when a charge from a shotgun penetrated his abdomen as he attempted to pull the weapon toward him through a fence, causing it to be accidentally discharged. But little hopes are entertained for his recovery.

The infant child of Mr. and Mrs. L. Haynes, is near death as the result of drinking a quantity of gasoline.

The office of the Killdeer Herald has been moved into the street to permit the progress of excavations for the new building which Editor Doherty will erect.

Francis, the 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Matt Meyer, near Mott, takes great pride in his achievement of running down a coyote on the prairie near his home. The lad spied the animal while on the way home from the field at noon and after eating his dinner he mounted a horse and captured the animal with little difficulty, after which he took the pelt to Mott, where he proudly exhibited it.

Henry Koch, who is employed on a farm near Hebron, invaded that peaceful little city after his work last Friday and after "taking on" a quantity of "rocky" attempted to turn the town upside down. He entered several business places and tried to smash up the furniture and finding that too tame for him chased several of the citizens about with a knife. The next day he was arrested and taken to Mandan for trial. He was charged with a serious offense.

In 34 North Dakota counties the census of which for 1920 has been announced by the United States census bureau, there are 432,576 people. Ten years ago those same counties had 390,984 people. The net increase in population of the group is 41,592. This indicates that the whole state population, when announced, will disclose an increase of 50,000 people, in the event that the counties still to be reported maintain about the same averages.

A reward of \$1000 has been offered by relatives of Peter P. Ink, Sr., of

Melville, N. D., who disappeared from home on August 1, for information that will locate the missing man. His description is given as: "Age 65; height about 5 feet 8 inches; weight 165 to 170; wears size 7 shoe; when he left home he wore a dark coat and dark trousers with hair stripe; light soft hat; black hair turned about one-half gray; sandy mustache turned partly gray; beard when not shaved

white; sandy complexion; very quiet disposition and had few b2ut few friendships; and had nervous breakdown and was not in the best of health."

Chief of Police Bowdon of Mar-marth has issued an edict that all automobiles must carry red tail lights which must be lighted after sunset. Violators must be prepared to take the consequences.

The Central labor union at Mandan has petitioned the city commission to establish a municipal coal yard. The commission has taken no action in the matter.
