

DEPUTY PLEADS GUILTY
Columbus, N. D., Nov. 16.—A cargo of liquor that disappeared after the men brought it across the line had been arrested, ostensibly handcuffed, and then had escaped back into Canada, brought Deputy Sheriff Mike Maher into court charged with failing to do his duty. He pleaded guilty be-

fore Judge Leighton, and was fined \$40 and costs. A former convict, it was brought out, conspired with a Canadian hotelman to bring 60 cases of liquor into North Dakota. Two rods on the American side of the line the convict and a companion were arrested by Maher, who pretended to handcuff them, it was charged. A few

minutes later the former convict was allowed to get into his car and drive away, while Maher, the authorities claim, took charge of the liquor, which has vanished.

C. C. Martin Found Guilty in District Court

The complaining witness was a neighbor named Egg who had gone to Martin's house to straighten out a cattle deal. Egg says Martin shot at him with a rifle. Martin was defended by J. E. Greene and States Attorney Metzger of Williams county assisted by D. C. Greenleaf prosecuted the case. Martin will be sentenced Nov. 29.

Henry Vinkle, father of Mrs. Minnie Slocum, witnessed the first inauguration of General U. S. Grant as president, March 4, 1869. Speaking of the event Mr. Vinkle said that he and Mrs. Vinkle who were on their wedding tour stood on the fifth step of the Capitol building where they enjoyed an uninterrupted view of the ceremony which was very impressive. Both Mr. and Mrs. Vinkle are still hale and hearty, despite over a half century passed since taking the vows which joined them in the holy bonds of wedlock. Mr. Vinkle says that his wife is still the same old sweet heart, as devoted and true as when at Dexter, Michigan, he courted her beneath the shade of the old elm trees which stood in the yard of her parents' home.
