


## BURNS CLUB MEMBERS HAVE FINE TIME AT ANNUAL MEET

The annual business meeting of the Minot Burns Club was held at the Elks Home Monday evening. President A. J. McCannel in the chair.

Secretary John Stewart read the report of the activities of the club during the past year and the report of the treasurer, Charles McKenzie, showed that the finances of the organization were in a particularly healthy condition. The club most heartily endorsed the work performed by the officers by re-electing President McCannel, Vice President D. A. Dinnie, Secretary Stewart, Treasurer McKenzie. Mesdames Wm. Murray and J. C. Smallwood, Sr., Ben McDonald and B. E. Stewart were selected as members of the executive committee. Following the election of officers the evening was given over to an improvised entertainment such as only the lads and lassies of Bonny Scotland can provide and this year's "feast of reason and flow of soul" far surpassed the expectations of the membership in so far as the quality of the numbers were concerned. Allan McDougall of Minneapolis with his bagpipes regaled the members with old familiar Scotch tunes, his repertoire including practically every one of the old time favorites. Miss Virginia Kinney of Minneapolis, a former Minot girl danced the Highland Fling to the accompaniment of the bagpipes and responded to the

heartily encores of the audience with others of the popular dances including the famous sword dance, her work throbbing being in the highest degree artistic and graceful. Mrs. Clyde Swigart kindled the fires of remem-

brance among the members by singing a couple of touching melodies of Scotland in an inimitable manner. Miss O'Connor gave several readings which delighted everyone present. She won the hearts of all by responding to repeated encores with such right good will, which added materially to the enjoyment of the entertainment. Judge Murray was called upon for a few remarks and responded with one of the most scholarly addresses on Scotland and the famous Bard of Avon, that it has ever been the writer's good pleasure to hear. The Judge lived for some time in the Burns' home in Scotland and in 1872 was present at the burial of the last remaining member of the Burns family, a son, whose remains were interred beside those of his father and mother in the mausoleum at Dumfries. Living in the immediate vicinity of the home of Burns he had many recollections to recount and intimate details to give of both the life of Burns and the environments which surrounded the brief period of the poet's life.

Judge Murray also paid a splendid tribute to the memory of William Hetherington, whose recent death in Scotland has cast a pall over the Scotch people of this community where he spent so many years of active business life. Miss Helen Wilson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Wilson, clad in the plaid and kilts of her clan, danced the Highland Fling to the accompaniment of the bagpipes—to her an innovation because of her birth where the sound of the piano is more familiar to her ears than the skirl of the pipes.

The Hon. James Johnson, denominated "Shamus Mac Johnson", by President McCannel who presided over the festivities was then called upon and spoke feelingly on the life and works of Burns, the poet. Mrs. Alex Scarlett, one of the charter members of the Minot Burns Club, whose delightful piano selections have characterized the meetings of the club at their annual meetings for years favored the members with a medley of Scotch airs.

The closing number was a tableau by Miss Kinney, wherein this little miss typified the "Living Flag". During this number the members arose and sang the national anthem, "The Star Spangled Banner".

At midnight supper was announced, the collation being served in the Elks' Club dining hall in the basement which had been tastefully decorated for the occasion, festoons of red, white and blue streamers being suspended from the ceiling while innumerable hearts, fairies and such like artistry in keeping with the day—Monday, St. Valentine's Day—hung from the streamers just above each of the tables. But it was not the decoration of the dining hall which attracted so much as the many tempting Scotch delicacies which the good ladies of the club had provided for the inner-man. Mayhap the Scotch menu is somewhat abbreviated, yet to the average member, who, perhaps, was not a "native son", it seemed that it would not be amiss to devote at least one celebration to commemorate the accomplishments of the Scotch ladies who could compound such splendid viands.

Prof. John Howard with his "feeder" with Mrs. Howard as his accompanist on the piano provided the music for the members as they danced the hours thru until the stroke of one when all departed feeling that this year's annual gathering was one of the most enjoyable the club had ever spent.

Judge Moelling Opens Term of Court in Minot

county, a brother of George Semington, deputy bank examiner; H. A. Nelson of Divide county, another Nonpartisan league backer; E. A. Bowman, state senator from LaMoure county, and Kristian Holl, member of the house of representatives from Williams county. The total of these notes is \$12,900, which represents public moneys taken out of the Bank of North Dakota and which found its way into Nonpartisan league institutions through the Kloten bank. All told, the Kloten bank had \$65,000 when the Bishop, Brissman & Co. audit was made Dec. 3.

Recall May Be Necessary  
The Independent forces at Bismarck will give the Nonpartisans an opportunity to save the state the expense of a recall. The recall election would be held in June.

The chance offered the league leaders to do their share toward saving North Dakota from further financial embarrassment developed yesterday when two bills were introduced in the house. The first of these provides that the industrial commission shall consist of the state treasurer, secretary of state and commissioner of agriculture and labor. Its passage would mean that John T. Seen and Thomas Hall, independents, would take the place of Governor Frazier and Atty. Geo. William Lemke, leaving J. N. Hagan, commissioner of agriculture

and labor, as the only leaguer on the commission. The second bill provides that all state public deposits shall be made in state and national banks. This would not only take these funds out of the Bank of North Dakota but would prevent that institution from acting as financial agent for the state industries and would leave it merely as a rural credits bank.

Other bills for the same purpose will be introduced, and if the Nonpartisan league members of the senate, who are in the majority in that branch of the legislature, kill them the recall election will be the result and the law will be initiated.
