from apoplexy. Miss Melos had been in poor health for a long time and left Minot a week previous to her death, going to Northwood. She submitted to an operation for appendicitis a week before her death and was recovering nicely from the operation.

The funeral was held April 13 at the old home, Cresco, Iowa, the remains being interred at the Oak Lawn cemetery near that city. Miss Melos was 42 years of age and is survived by nine brothers and four sisters; Henry J. Melos of Minot, Hans Melos of Berthold, Nels of Fargo, Jos. of Fertig, Minn., Martin of Chicago, Gilbert, John, Gander and Anton of Cresco, Iowa; Belle Amundson, Berthold; Christina Oyen, Fergus Falls, Minn.; Rachel Melos and Clara Anderson of Cresco, Iowa.

Miss Melos came to Ward county 15 years ago and proved up on a homestead near Lone Tree. She had lived in Minot for nearly two years before her death. All of the brothers and sisters attended the funeral except two brothers, Hans and Nels.

This is a most remarkable family. Out of a family of fifteen children, only one had died, Ole Melos, having passed away 27 years ago. Miss Melos was born at Cresco, Iowa, and spent her early life near that city.

Miss Melos was a member of the Lutheran church at Berthold and was a fine Christian woman. A host of friends extend their sincerest sympathy to the surviving relatives.

Preparing Material for Highway Booklet

T. C. Hutchinson of Williston, publication manager of the North Dakota Division Theodore Roosevelt International Highway Association, was in Minot Wednesday enroute to Grand Forks. He is preparing material for 5,000 booklets to be issued about June 1, giving information and scenes taken along the route in North Dakota. He will work westward. Minot will be given a prominent place in the book. Mr. Hutchinson reports the roads along the Roosevelt Highway in excellent condition and much work is being done on them this year. The 34 miles between Ray and Williston are in fine condition and the trail thru Mountrail county will be put into good condition this year. He estimated that 10,000 tourists will pass thru Minot on the Roosevelt highway this season. Mr. Hutchinson is manager of the Williston Herald, one of the state's very best weekly papers.

Ward County Pupils Submit Interesting Drawings
