 The first game was one worth seeing

and good baseball was played by both teams. Bismarck scored 3 and 2 runs the first and second inning and that was for them. The locals scored their runs thru hits by Moore, who hit two over the fence and a triple in four times up, counting for all the runs except for one out of the six. Higgins and Anderson performed for Bismarck and Shirley and Moore for Minot. Hig-

gins should have won his game but poor head work with Moore to bat the second and third time cost him his game, as Moore should have been passed. Shirley was off as he got himself into holes in all innings and was lucky to get out with a walk. Morris went in and pitched to the last two men in the ninth with men on bases and the side was retired without any runs coming in.

The second game was a good game also until the eighth inning when the score 4-3 for Minot and two outs and none on the visiting pitcher muffed an easy fly and let Hester reach first. It must have got his "goat" as he filled the bases and with some hits sandwiched in with errors and walks, three men scored and left three men on when the third was made, making the score at the end 7-3 as neither side counted again. Morris and More were on the points for Minot and Anderson and Anderson for Bismarck. Both pitchers worked well except for that one bad inning for the Bismarck pitcher.

The third game went for Minot 4-0 in a well played game with Higpawer and Griffin working for Minot and Chris Anderson for Bismarck. The visiting pitcher seemed to have quite a bit of "stuff" on the ball and got away very well. Higpawer had the visitors "going" at all times, easing up at times and getting "tight" when they had a chance to score. It was a bad, cold day and considering this it was a well played game.

The locals looked like a ball team in this series and it can be seen that they have one of the best, if not the best team that ever represented the city. It takes a lot of money to run the team and as the weather has been bad all the time for baseball, the crowds have not been up to what they must be to keep the team going. There are some fine games coming up soon, the Calgary Black Sox coming here the 6th, 8th and 9th for two games. Both teams are fast and have divided a series just played at Valley City and the stands should be filled for all these games. Bismarck was scheduled for the 10th, 11th, and 12th for 3 games here but they are cancelled to be played in Bismarck.
