### 4,000 Attend Minot Auto Club Picnic

A crowd of fully 4,000 people from Minot and other towns in this section of the state gathered at Rice Lake Sunday to enjoy the first annual picnic of the Minot Auto Club.

The day was one of the finest of North Dakota's perfect summer days and the road was perfect. Rice Lake lies 27 miles southwest of Minot, on the Minot-Ryder county graded road and a number of autos went out from Minot in less than an hour. Practically everybody who went in the forenoon took their dinners and spread them under the trees that fringe the lake. Water was furnished by a splendid spring, one of a number which feed the beautiful fresh water lake.

A number of boats were on the lake, including a sail boat and rowing and sailing furnished some good sport. The water was just right for bathing. The beach is the finest in this section of the state. The beach is sandy and as clean as a floor and goes out gradually for many rods before finally getting deep. In places, the water is 35 or 40 feet deep in the lake.

Fishing was not extra good Sunday. There are numerous fine perch in the lake but mostly small fish were caught Sunday and these were thrown back. The water in Rice Lake is ideal for fish life. The first fish were "planted" in the lake six years ago and since that time have become very particular effort has been taken to see that the fish laws are not violated. There are "fish hogs" who have taken fish out of the lake by the barrel, pickling the fish for summer's use and it is said that they didn't catch them all with hook and line, either.

Hundreds of farmers living in the section southwest of Minot gathered at the lake and enjoyed the outing with the town folks.

The Purity Ice Cream Co. had a refreshment stand on the grounds, doing a landoffice business. They disposed of 45 gallons of ice cream, thousands of ice cream cones and every solitary thing hauled out to the grounds.

Berthold turned out en masse and took advantage of the immense crowd to advertise the Berthold 4th of July celebration. There were 35 autos in the Berthold parade and the 27-piece band was brot along, playing an enjoyable concert. The band is directed by Rev. Father Arsenault, a cornetist of high class. Father Arsenault directs two bands at Berthold, the adult and juvenile bands, and is getting ready to direct an orchestra. He is a live wire community worker. The Berthold celebration will include an address by President Beeler of the Minot Normal; ball games between Plaza and Donnybrook and between the Berthold and Carpio high school ball teams. The Berthold contingent had driven to Plaza, Ryder and Makot that day and intended stopping at Des Lacs.

Members of the Minot Gun Club were on the grounds shooting at clay pigeons and a number of their friends joined them in the sport, many amateurs shooting for the first time. A ball game was in progress during the afternoon.

Never have more automobiles been seen at Rice Lake. At one o'clock a count was made and there were 512 autos on the grounds. They came loaded, it being estimated that each car carried an average load of six. Many drove to the lake during the afternoon.

The picnic was a big success and accomplished the purpose of the Minot Auto Club in bringing about closer relations between the farmers and the townspeople. President Ray Miller and Secretary Welch of the Auto Club are receiving the congratulations of all.

John McGuire was marshal of the day. His assistants were J. C. Smallwood, Carl Cox, J. K. Woodward and Colonel L. F. Vollmer.

A tug of war between Minot and Ryder was won by Ryder. This was to be expected as the Ryderites have had a good deal of practice pulling pious around. Drady won from Ryder in a tug of war contest.

The boy's potato race was won by Stewart Detch of Rice Lake.

The girls' potato race was won by Signa Wold.

The horse shoe contest was won by Tom West of Minot who vanquished all opposition with ease.

**Drive to Reach Every Disabled Man**  
The "eligibility squad" from the Minneapolis office of the Federal Board for Vocational Education who will visit eight centers in the state will be in Minot from June 25th, 2:30 P. M. to June 27th, 5:30 P. M., and will serve men from the counties of Divide, Burke, Renville, Williams, Mountrail, Ward, McHenry and McKenzie.

This squad will be composed of G. E. Hardy, Eligibility Officer, who represents the central office at Washington, D. C. A public health service doctor, C. R. Boink, Contact Officer, Fred W. Zeller, Advisor from the H. Q. local office of the Federal Board, Wm. T. Kroll, State War Risk Office of the American Legion and C. T. Hoverson of the Bureau of War Risk Insurance, the latter to adjust compensation claims and arrange for hospitalization.

This squad will be able to make medical examinations, certify to official papers, advise men as to training and give transportation to schools to those who are found eligible and desire to enter immediately.

This means that the Board is coming as nearly as possible to the man. All ex-service men to whom this notice comes should inform others whom he thinks may be interested. Every disabled ex-service man who is hindered in carrying on his pre-war occupation should receive training so that he can compete others. This squad is out to see that such men get into training and if each man will give his assistance by bringing with him all official, military and government papers in his possession, hundreds of disabled veterans in North Dakota should go into training. If you have a wound, injury or disease incurred in a traceable manner to your military service, and have not yet made application for compensation or vocational training, come to Minot on the 25th of June and avoid a lot of correspondence in the future by letting this squad handle your case.

C. R. Boink and W. T. Kroll are in Minot this week completing arrangements for the coming of the squad. They go from here to Devils Lake to make arrangements there.

### SECURES BOATS FOR THE BOY SCOUTS

Aksel Bratsberg went to Devils Lake last week where he secured two fine row boats and one sailing boat for the Minot Boy Scouts. The sailing boat is 22 feet long and all the boats are in the finest condition. Mr. Bratsberg, who learned to be a sailor as a youth in Norway, has volunteered to spend a day or two with the boys at Rice Lake showing them how to sail the boat. A sailing boat unless handled by someone who knows how is dangerous, but when properly handled, as it will be, will furnish the finest kind of sport for the Boy Scouts. The boats will be paid for out of the fund being raised by the people of Minot. The boats will be taken out to the lake this week on trucks, to be in readiness for the Scouts who will go into camp during the latter part of June, to remain until early in July. They will be there for the Fourth. Prof. Mueller of the Minot Normal, has been granted permission by President Beeler, to be in charge of the Boy Scouts Camp.

### ANTLER STATE BANK HAS BEEN REOPENED
