

GRAIN TRADE'S HARVEST GUNS TO ROAR THIS WEEK

Cooperative Marketing to Get Bap-tism of Fire From Grain Men's Convention

Chicago, Oct. 5—Grain growers of the Middle West are about to be told again that they face certain failure in their efforts to establish a national co-operative sales agency. Hundreds of representatives of the organized grain trade will meet in Chicago October 3, 4, and 5 to attend the annual meeting of the Grain Dealer's National Association, the organization that fathered the Mansfield \$250,000 propaganda committee, now famous because of its unsuccessful efforts to attach the stigma of socialism to co-operative marketing. This same is the committee directly responsible for the "Remember North Dakota Remember the Nonpartisan League" slogan used early in the campaign made possible when a "slush" fund of a quarter million of dollars was pledged at Cincinnati.

"Farmers may as well prepare themselves for an avalanche of propaganda," says C. H. Gustafson, president of the U. S. Grain Growers. "The organized grain trade will bring its heaviest guns to bear on co-operative marketing during this meeting, but an institution that is founded as solidly as is the U. S. Grain Growers and has weathered the grain men's initial attack, will not be damaged by the second phase of the battle."

Publications which get practically all of their revenue from the grain trade, for several weeks have been busy trying to get as many delegates as possible to attend the Chicago meeting. The Western Grain Journal, typical of this class, in its current issue says:

"Without doubt, the biggest problem before the association is the co-operative movement fathered by the U. S. Grain Growers. The Grain Dealer's National Association was the author and booster of the plan to SPREAD PROPOGANDA showing the faults and impracticability of the plan. Further consideration will be given the grain grower's SCHEME at the annual meeting and it is of utmost importance that PROPAGANDA BE CONTINUED TO DISCREDIT THE FARMER'S MOVEMENT. Every grain man should give his support to the national convention so that its resolutions will be backed by the largest gathering of grain men ever held."

This sentiment, printed in one of the organized grain trade's most representative publications, indicates just what producers may expect before the meeting here ends.

Normal School Notes

Registration Day for the Fall term found a large number of students on hand ready for work. By Monday of the second week registration had reached a total of 215, which is an increase of about 30 per cent over last Fall Term.

McDonough, English; Miss Leona Taylor, School Business; Everett Davis, Manual Arts; the Misses Elsie J. Cook, Mary G. Rud, Shirley D. Almy, Edith C. Wood and Mrs. Margaretta Davis, Critics. In the Administration Offices are Miss Christie Budget, Secretary of the Normal School and her assistant, Miss Laura Colton, and Miss Mable Ward, Secretary to the President.

President Beeler has a series of speaking appointments at various County Institutes. On Oct. 3 he appears before the Rolette Co. Institute at Rolla; on Tuesday Oct. 4, at Cando in the Towne Co. Institute and at Washburn on Wednesday before the McLean County Institute. He has other appointments for succeeding weeks.

During the week of Oct. 10th the Counties of Ward and McHenry will

hold a joint Institute at the State Normal School. Supts. Erma Smith and A. M. Waller have held a conference with Pres. Beeler to make the preliminary arrangements. A number of the faculty of the Normal School will co-operate in giving courses to the visiting teachers. It is possible to arrange department work which is greatly appreciated. A large attendance is expected.

Pres. Beeler has arranged for monthly faculty dinners during the present school year. The first of these will be held at the Dormitory on Friday evening, Oct. 8th at 7:30. The meal will be followed by the presentation of some topic of professional interest and discussion. Pres. Beeler will present the first paper.

Mrs. Amy M. Simpson, Director of Music, has found a ready response to the call for Glee Club and Orchestra. At the first meeting some 35 girls reported as interested in Glee Club and a dozen or more in Orchestra. The indications are that these institutions will flourish as in other years.




