500 word report of lecture by William D. Kilpatrick

Christian Science has come to humanity to restore to it the lost art of healing which the great Master-Christian, Jesus the Christ, declared of those truths of existence which he gave to the world some twenty centuries ago. Harry Eck, formerly with the Minot Auto Co. and Leo Finnegan have organized the Rapid Transit Co. and are operating one of the big white buses on the streets of Minot, between the hours of 6:30 a. m. and 9 p. m. The bus runs on a schedule and makes a complete loop of the city every 45 minutes. A charge of ten cents is made to any part of the city, except to the south hill, the route not yet being extended to that part of the city. The distance around the loop is 5 1/2 miles. The bus is meeting with considerable favor and the men behind the proposition believe their venture will prove a big success.

The company also makes two trips to Max daily, starting from the Leland Hotel.

Grand Forks Seed Loan Headquarters

Washington, March 18.—Selection of Grand Forks, North Dakota, as headquarters for distribution of seed grain loans amounting to \$1,500,000 authorized by Congress was announced by Secretary Wallace. The appropriation of the relief fund, most of which will probably be used in North Dakota and Montana, has been sent to the White House with the expectation that the President would sign it Monday.

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
