Ward Co. Schools Show Remarkable Growth

his sixth year of successful service. Surrey, though a small village, has for years past, given to the pupils of its territory educational advantages often lacking in a much larger place. She has maintained, in spite of the cost, a full high school course. Added to this cost, has been that of furnishing transportation to all the pupils of the district. With reference to transportation it can be said that all the classified high schools of the county, except Minot, which has no territory outside its city limits, have been providing such transportation to their pupils at public expense. Surrey can well be proud of her educational achievements which are undoubtedly unsurpassed by those of any village of equal size in the state. Supt. S. C. Anderson is at the helm of this school and has four teachers to assist him. In addition to the village school the district operates a two-room consolidated school in the eastern portion of the township, where the work of the first eight grades is carried on under the direction of the Misses Marie and Cornelia Niedermeier.

As a new village back in 1907, Ryder began its school work with a two department institution. A new building was erected a number of years later which met all requirements for some time. These quarters were outgrown and it was found necessary to secure another building for temporary use but even then the housing facilities were inadequate and a large addition to the schoolhouse was built. Ryder with its wide-awake citizens is progressing educationally as is evidenced by the growth and continued efficiency of its schools. Supt. C. H. Klafke with six fellow workers are in charge.

Carpio with its good schools under the direction of Prin. S. H. Miller and five co-workers is forging to the front in fine shape. That the people of the district are alive to the needs of a good school and aware of the benefits to be derived therefrom is shown by the fact that a large bond issue has been issued to make sure the erection of a school house which will take care of the wants of their children.

Foxholm, like its sister to the northwest, has also bonded for the purpose of erecting a modern and commodious building to take the place of the one now in use. With the present quarters it is not possible to give any high school work as but two teachers can now be employed. When the proposed new building is erected which will be begun, as soon as the money can be secured from its bond issue, Foxholm will be in a position to well care for all pupils of its district. The instructors of the school are Prin. Anna M. Schwalier and Miss Irene Tracy.

Burlington, the hustling little village on the Soo just west of Minot, and the original county seat of Ward county, has a fine four-roomed brick structure, which furnishes a school home for the pupils of the village and most of Burlington township. Under the guidance of Prin. M. L. Nelson and his three fellow teachers, the school is doing very creditable work.

Sawyer, in its fine school home maintains a school system in which its supporters take much pride and well they may. Prin. A. J. Spacht and his four assistants are doing a work which is highly pleasing to the school officers and patrons of the school. The district is composed of the village and township of Sawyer.

Douglas, at the extreme southern boundary of the county, is certainly doing its utmost to provide for the educational needs of the children of the village and surrounding country. Situated in the southeast corner of section 36, Douglas furnishes excellent school privileges for pupils of at least five different school districts, three in Ward and two in McLean counties. Its present structure is entirely too small to meet the demands upon it and the probability is that an addition equal in size to the one now in use will be built as soon as financial conditions will permit. Prin. Troy J. Wilson and a corps of four teachers are in charge.

Makoti, also of the southern portion of the county, has an educational institution which is the pride of its people. It's one drawback at this time is its lack of room. The present structure, which was erected several years ago and which at that time was thought to be large enough for all time to come, is badly overcrowded. Additional space will doubtless have to be provided this coming year thru rented quarters or the erection of a suitable addition. Prin. O. M. Fraser and seven other teachers constitute the faculty.

Des Lacs has one of the finest school buildings ever erected in this section of the state and its people can proudly point it out as their one single greatest possession. Within the walls of this brick structure is maintained a school system as sound and durable as is the building itself. The destinies of this school are presided over by Prin. Smith Taylor and his four able assistants.

Lone Tree under the guidance of Prin. Thos. A. Crawford, who is completing his fifth year of continuous service in this school, and three fellow teachers has built up a system from a grade school to one presenting a complete high school course. The district embraces the village of Lone Tree and thirty four outlying sections of land. The school building is a commodious four room brick structure.

Wolseth, a little hamlet on the Sherwood branch of the Great Northern railway, lying between Deering and Glenburn, has a well equipped two room building with living rooms for teachers in the second story. Grade work is successfully done as is also a portion of the first year of high school under two teachers, Prin. Alpha Olson and Miss Ruby J. Young.

Niobe, located in the extreme northwestern part of the county, employs two teachers, Prin. Mary B. King and Miss Clara Rodin. These handle grade work only, no high school equipment having yet been provided. Niobe hopes to some time in the near future furnish high school facilities to resi-

dent pupils who have completed their grade work.

There are three rural consolidated schools in addition to the one already mentioned as belonging to Surrey district. The names of these schools with their teachers are as follows: Stammen Dist. No. 28, near Foxholm. Prin. Ruth Olson and Miss Eva Spaulding; Burt Dist. No. 128, two miles west of Drady. Prin. Mrs. Alfred Spokkie and Miss Agnes Nordquist; Harrison Dist. No. 2, seven miles southwest of Minot. Prin. Clara Gaardsmoie and Miss Goldie Little. These are all grade schools of two departments and are doing successful work. Living quarters are furnished the teachers and are all modern.

Among the denominational schools of the county which have been and are doing successful school work are the Bronson High School, north of Kenmare, the St. Agnes Parochial School at Kenmare and the Seventh Day Adventist school in Minot.

During the past school year there were 333 teaching positions in the county filled by 31 men and 302 women. The average monthly salary for men was \$165.69 and for women \$110.14, with an average of \$114.55 for all teachers. The total salary paid men was \$52,622.81 and women \$312,162.45. Graduating total of \$364,835.30. The expenditures for the year for all school purposes were \$671,041.22.

There are 9,146 children of school age in the county. Of these 7,985 were enrolled in school. The percentage of attendance for the year was 88%. The discrepancy in enumeration and enrollment is due to the fact that all pupils between the ages of 6 and 21 are counted even though they may have already finished their course or may not yet have reached the compulsory school age.

The total number of eighth grade graduates for last year were approximately 500 and high school graduates numbered nearly 150. Graduating exercises were held in all high, graded and consolidated schools and in many one room rural schools where there were eighth grade graduates. Much interest was manifested in these exercises by school patrons and others and it is to be hoped that the plan will be more generally followed in the future.

There has been a fine spirit of co-operation among school officials, teachers, pupils and patrons and this has had much to do with the present high standing of the schools of Ward County. That their high standard of efficiency may be continued is assured by the earnest desire of all concerned that the educational welfare of the future citizenry of Ward county be given the unstinted support of all people.


