

Business and Professional Women Entertain

Last evening the Business and Professional Women's Club of Minot met in a dinner meeting at the Leland Hotel, having as their guest of honor Miss Henricka Beach, of Bismarck, who is the President of the State Federation of Business and Business Women's Clubs.

The feature of the meeting was the talk of Miss Beach. In substance she outlined the work and possibilities of the work for women through these Clubs. There are now about three hundred fifty federated Clubs in United States; there are thirteen within the State, seven of which are federated.

The objects of these clubs is to promote the interest of women in the various lines of work in which they are engaged. The women work have many things in common, and being social beings, need just the fellowship that such a club affords.

Miss Beach stressed the fact that since women play such a large part in the business world, it is necessary that they should learn their business thoroughly; become efficient in their own particular line, and thus make themselves invaluable to their employers.

In many instances women occupy responsible positions similar to those held by men, and by proving their efficiency in such lines are eligible to the same salaries as the men are. Salaries, however, should not be the first thought of a business woman. Our first thought should be turned to the problems that confront both the older and the younger business girl, and try to find solutions and help each other.

Miss Beach gave interesting accounts of the work of other Clubs throughout the State, mentioning several get-together meetings between Clubs from different cities, thus promoting an active interest in the women in other cities besides their own.

The State Convention of Business and Professional Women's Clubs is to be held May 18, and 19th, at Grand Forks. The National Convention will be held in Chattanooga, Tenn. The meetings of the latter Convention are to be held in a Hotel situated on Lookout Mountain. This will be in July.

After the dinner Miss Beach met with the Board of directors, and matters of importance to the Club were discussed.

Such proposals will be received at the office of the Secretary of the State Publication and Printing Commission in the Capitol in the city of Bismarck, North Dakota, until the hour of three o'clock P. M. on the 31st day of April, 1922, and will thereat be opened in public by the State Publication and Printing Commission at Bismarck, North Dakota.

Said printing and binding consists of that required by the first, second, third, fourth and fifth classifications of state printing as follows:

CLASS 1. The printing of bills, resolutions and any documents for the use of and incident to the Legislative Assembly.

CLASS 2. The printing and binding of the journals of the Senate and the House of Representatives.

CLASS 3. The printing and binding of the volume of laws, with the joint resolutions, which shall be included in said volume.

CLASS 4. The printing and binding of the volume of laws, with the joint resolutions, which shall be included in said volume.

CLASS 5. The printing of all blanks, circulars and other miscellaneous job work necessary or the use of the executive department, other than such as are printed in pamphlet form and not entering into the volume of executive documents, and all printing not included in the foregoing classes.

Such proposals must state the class of work being bid for and the rates for composition, setting, folding and binding, and the price at which the bidder will perform the labor and furnish stock and all material to complete the work. Each bid must be in writing, and sealed and addressed to the Secretary of the State Publication and Printing Commission at Bismarck, North Dakota, and must be accompanied by a surety bond in the penal sum of \$4000.00 the said bond to be approved as to form and execution by the Attorney General, and executed by the bidder with sufficient surety to be approved by the State Publication and Printing Commission, conditioned among other things that the bidder will within ten days,

after the acceptance of the bid, by the said Commission, enter into a written contract with the State of North Dakota in accordance therewith and will thereafter perform such contract according to the terms and in accordance with the specifications hereinafter mentioned, provided, however, that when a bidder submits proposals for more than one class of printing, said bond of \$4000.00 shall be deemed sufficient to cover all bids.


