

HOWARD WILL DIRECT COMMUNITY BAND THIS SUMMER

A joint meeting of the boards of directors of the Association of Commerce, Rotary, Kiwanis and Town Crier Clubs, and members of the Minot Park Board was held during the luncheon hour at the Grand Cafe, Tuesday. Carl E. Danielson, president of the Association of Commerce, was chairman of the meeting.

John E. Howard, director of music in the Minot schools, and director of the Minot Community Band was asked to address the meeting and outline the activities of the band during the coming summer.

Mr. Howard will remain in Minot during the summer vacation, and will continue to direct the band. The Association of Commerce will finance the organization and will be ably assisted by members from the other clubs. Mr. Howard explained that, while no member of the band receives a salary, it will be necessary to equip the organization of 40 members with uniforms costing approximately \$1200 while his services during the ten weeks will cost much less than his present salary. Mr. Howard stated that two concerts will be given weekly, one some evening in the business district and a Sunday afternoon concert at the park. The Community band will be available for Memorial day, our 4th of July celebration, and other events.

Wm. Fahlander, representing the Minot Tailors Association, appeared and discussed an educational advertising campaign that has been inaugurated by the tailors of Minot with a view of discouraging ordering clothing from foreign tailoring concerns. He said that \$25,000.00 worth of suits for Minot men are being made in other cities annually, on orders taken by suit case peddlers. The Minot tailors are quite able to make as good clothing for the same money and less, and he asked the co-operation of the

people of Minot in behalf of the local tailors.

A resolution was offered and adopted unanimously that the organizations represented endorse a "Buy at Home" movement advanced by any group of businessmen in Minot and that they may be privileged to use such endorsement in their advertising as may be approved by a Vigilance committee consisting of the presidents of the Association of Commerce, the Town Criers, Kiwanis and Rotary clubs. The presidents were authorized to formulate a slogan to be used in such advertising.

President Danielson asked the co-operation of the various clubs for the welfare of the Association of Commerce, and he was assured that those bodies would back him up whole heartedly.

"Just tell us what to do and we'll go out and do it", one of the members remarked and this seemed to be the spirit of the entire assemblage.

The Lutherans have had their eyes on Minot for a long time. In 1915 the proposition was taken under consideration and for a time it was believed that the Lutherans would take over the Ward county hospital.


