Derricks Used to Relay Double Track

The Great Northern Railway Co. is removing one of its tracks between Devils Lake and Churchs Ferry and removing it west where it is being laid between Williston and Ray, the G. N. putting in a double track between those points. The work is being done in an interesting manner.

Two derricks are used to lift three double rail lengths, ties and all, which are lifted and placed on three flat cars. It is being relaid with derricks, the operation saving \$1200 a mile over the old method. Each of the three rail lengths represents a load weighing six tons.


