to prove fatal to the yield. About 60 per cent of the wheat was put in early enough to be so advanced that rust is not likely to do very great damages. Mr. Tinglestad states that there was no rust in the Valley up to Sunday, July 22, but since that date black rust has appeared there and would be alarming were it not for the fact that all the wheat in the Valley is so advanced that it will be ready to cut by the first of August.
