Minnesota Couple "Buys" Little Girl At Auction for \$30

Chicago, July 28.—Held for ransom to satisfy a \$405 bond and physician's bill incurred by her father, now serving a term in the house of correction, Marie Bakker, aged 5, was "sold" at auction by Judge Adams in the court of domestic relations to the highest bidder.

The child went to Mr. and Mrs. John Kenney wealthy residents of Renville, Minn., who had journeyed to Chicago to attend the sale. Their bid was \$30.

When Marie's mother died a year ago, her father took her and himself to board at the home of Mrs. A. Stolpman. He fell behind in his payments and Mrs. Stolpman brought him into the court of domestic relations on a charge of contributing to the dependency of a child. When he could not pay the judge sent him to the house of correction.

Mrs. Kenney, sister of the child's dead mother, heard of these conditions and sought to have the homeless child added to her flock of eight, but the Stolpmans blocked her efforts. They finally agreed that the Kenneys might take Marie if they would pay up all back indebtedness.

Judge Adams arbitrated the claims and allowed them but \$30, the board for the child since her father went to jail. The Kenneys paid this sum and started for Minnesota with their purchase, who seemed overjoyed that she had been "sold up the river."

Rush at Work on Plans for West Wing of Normal

Ira L. Rush, who has been awarded the contract to furnish plans and specifications for the west wing of the Minot Normal school, motored to Bismarck Tuesday where he conferred with members of the Board of Administration. He was authorized to go ahead with the plans and the Board plans to award the contract early in the fall, so the construction work can be started before cold weather. The new wing will be 67x87 feet, three stories, and will cost approximately \$80,000.00. The outside elevation will be the same as that of the east wing. The first floor will take care of the manual training department and the agricultural laboratories, while the library 59x65 feet will be located on the second floor. The library will be 59x65 feet. The Domestic Science and class rooms will be located on the third floor.

Homebuilders Lose in N. D. Court Decision

Bismarck, July 28.—Persons for whom homes were built by the State Home Building association need pay only the cost agreed on for the houses not the actual cost of construction, according to a decision by District Judge Thomas H. Pugh of Dickinson. George E. Wallace, former state tax commissioner, should have a new home built for him for the basic charge for the standard plans used, plus extras he had agreed on, \$6,200, the decision says. C. O. Fosum, who also had a house built in Bismarck by the commission, shall receive it for \$4,500 instead of the \$7,293 listed as the cost by the commission.

The case will be appealed to the state supreme court by the association.

FUNDS FOR MARKETING N. D. CROP ASSURED

Fargo, July 27.—"There is ample credit available from the war finance corporation and Federal Reserve bank to aid farmers in the orderly marketing of their wheat this fall," E. J. Weiser, North Dakota banker, and director of the War Finance corporation says.

"I can see no reason why any man in good standing, having grain to sell and with storage facilities for holding it, cannot get all the help he needs. I feel sure that the notes of the farmers given for such a time as will insure an orderly marketing of his crop will be gladly handled by the larger banks."




