TRAIN KILLS TWO BISMARCK MEN
 Mandan, N. D., Aug. 28.—Blinded by the dust of other cars, Herbert Martinson, 26, single, barber, and Fred Wilmovsky, 24, single, employed by the Dunham Lumber company, both of Bismarck, received fatal injuries, both dying within an hour, when the Ford coupe in which they were riding was struck by N. P. train No. 7 on the main line crossing of the Bismarck-Mandan highway just west of Mandan Sunday.
 The car, driven by Martinson, was thrown 50 feet from the crossing when struck squarely, and was literally torn to pieces, sections being thrown 150 to 200 feet away. Other autoists who witnessed the accident picked up the badly mangled men, rushing Wilmovsky to the Deaconess hospital in Mandan, and Martinson to a hospital in Bismarck.
 Witnesses to the accident declare a heavy dust cloud had been caused by the scores of cars on the road, and the men apparently were endeavoring to cross the track but because of the distance could not accurately gauge the distance of the train. Neither regained consciousness after the accident.
 The body of Wilmovsky, prepared for burial here, will be taken to Russo, N. D., where his parents reside. Martinson will be buried at Bismarck.
 The crossing where the car was struck has been condemned by the federal government, and will be eliminated when the new highway between Mandan and Bismarck of which the new \$2,000,000 bridge is a part is completed. Northern Pacific engineers, United States war department, bureau of roads, and the state and county officials co-operating, have already prepared plans for a subway under this and other tracks.

 "Bill" Jones Is "Some" Cow Puncher
 Wm. F. Jones, secretary of the Minot Town Criers Club, and head salesman at the Samuelson shoe store, met with a series of mishaps at the Wm. Gibb ranch near Sanish, where he spent the week-end.
 Mr. Jones had always had a desire to ride a bucking broncho and that desire was filled to overflowing Monday. He borrowed a pair of chaps, a lasso and a six shooter from one of the ranch hands and set out to capture coyotes. The cayuse he was riding soon became aware of the fact that he was carrying an inexperienced rider and threw him to the ground. He then added injury to insult, kicking and bruising one of his legs. Jones got out of this predicament in some fortunate fashion and in the afternoon wanted to gain a brand new experience in the harvest field. He was given a team to drive and turned them too short in going down a hill, upsetting a load of bundle oats. His other leg caught in the rack and his ankle was sprained. Mr. Jones was assisted to the house and a pair of crutches improvised for him. He has returned to the city and is able to hobble about with the aid of his sticks.
 Mr. Jones and daughters, Pauline and Margie, accompanied C. F. Truax to the ranch, and Mrs. Truax who has been spending several weeks there, returned with them.

 Hog Feed Trials Begun at A. C. Feeding trials for the purpose of determining the effect of different amounts of tankage on hogs are being started at the experiment station here, according to J. H. Shepperd, chairman of the animal husbandry department.
 "Tankage, when fed in the self-feeder so that the hogs get all they will eat averages a gain of 16.75 lbs. more a head, but the cost of the tankage when freely fed was so great that \$17.16 less profit was made per hog, in our experiments last year," said Mr. Shepperd.
 The trials this year consist of four lots with 12 hogs to each lot, with each of the four breeds, Poland China, Duroc, Chester White and Yorkshire represented in each lot. Each lot of hogs is given 2 7/8 acres of white flint corn for forage.
 Hogs in lot No. 1 will have all the tankage they can eat in addition to the corn. Lot No. 2 is limited to 4 pound of tankage per hog a day, while lot No. 3 is given no tankage but is allowed to forage one-half acre of alfalfa. Lot No. 4 gets nothing but corn.
 Hogs in the cornfield with freed tankage ate an average of 8 lb. tankage a day over the 56-day period of the trial last season. Experiments show that pasturing alfalfa with corn replaces tankage and is less costly.

 N. D. Tomatoes Mature Early in the South
 Fargo, N. D.—North Dakota Earliana tomatoes, planted in Kentucky this year, matured two weeks earlier than any other tomatoes in that state, according to a letter received by A. F. Yeager, horticulturist at the N. D. A. C. from F. Merriman, county agent at Louisville, Ky.
 "In every instance this strain of Earliana was earlier than any strain grown in the country. One gardener reports that he is especially well pleased with this tomato and next year will be in the market for considerable seed," writes Mr. Merriman.
 "From my own personal observation, I feel that you have an extra early Earliana and a heavy bearer, but a little inclined to be rough. I feel that if this roughness could be eliminated, you would have one of the best products that has ever come to my attention."
 "We are pleased to find," said Mr. Yeager, "that in our efforts to produce a tomato that will benefit North Dakota people we have benefitted the whole country."

 Spotted Tomatoes Lack Water
 Fargo, N. D.—Black spots have been found at the blossom ends of tomatoes by many gardeners and farmers, suggesting that the tomatoes were being attacked by a fungus disease. These spots are caused by shrinking of the skin due to lack of water in the soil, according to A. F. Yeager, horticulturist at the North Dakota Agricultural College.
