

FINAL ORDER FILED IN WILL CASE; M. KELLER GETS FARM

A remittitur or final order of the Supreme Court has been filed with the Clerk affirming a judgment in favor of Mary Keller against the brothers and sisters of Joseph Reichert and others.

Our readers will remember that this case was tried for a week or more in District Court in February, 1921, the jury finding in favor of Miss Keller as the beneficiary under the will made by Joseph Reichert whom she was shortly to marry. The young lady by this decision gets 280 acres of land left to her under the will.

Probably no case tried for years in District Court gave rise to the interest that this one did. The case was hard fought on both sides in the District Court and was appealed to the Supreme Court and heard and judgment affirmed. The Supreme Court was divided 3 to 2. The case is finally settled in favor of Miss Keller.

Jack O'Leary, Foxholm banker, was in Minot Monday.

Anthony Walton transacted business in Fargo early in the week.

The Knights of Pythias lodge resumed operations for the fall Tuesday night.

The Glenburn school has rented the Lutheran church to care for excess number of students.

N. Weber of Glenburn raised a 25 acre field of marquis wheat that averaged 34 bushels per acre.

Miss Gay Gidley, talented Glenburn young woman, has returned from a three-months tour of Europe.

Wine worms are said to be doing some damage to potatoes in the vicinity of Granville and Norwich.

Richard, the thirteen-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Louise Emerson, is recovering from an attack of pneumonia.

F. H. Moeller left for his home in Spokane Wash. Friday after spending two months looking after his interests here.

Miss Leona Lemieux, who is teaching in the Cole Harbor schools, spent Saturday and Sunday with her mother in this city.

An engine backing for coupling crushed Alva Pace of Glenburn into the feeder breaking an arm and otherwise bruising him up.

A dog fight meet was held at Antler last week. Over a hundred dogs and almost as many men from various quarters of the Union were in attendance at the trials which are held on the Canadian side.

R. N. Nurnberger, Vela's potato king, started digging his large crop of tubers last week. He has about 70 acres and his brother, E. A., has about 40 acres. They seem to be running about 200 bushels per acre.

Wm. N. McLeod, a pioneer of Pratt township, McHenry county, passed away at a Minot hospital, Sept. 11 following an operation. His body was shipped to the old home, Hastings, Mich. He was born in 1859.

Frank Grotzbach of Anamoose, has a Silver Hamburg pullet that established a new record by laying at the age of 3 months and 21 days. He plans to exhibit this bird at the St. Paul Poultry Show in January.

The separator belonging to John Osterberg living northwest of Mohall was destroyed by fire Wednesday afternoon about 4 o'clock. The cause of the fire is not definitely known but it is thought it was caused by sparks from the engine.

Andrew Budean, a farmer near Anamoose, brought to this city, last Thursday a load of Durum wheat, which weighed 10,310 pounds. This was the largest load ever hauled into Anamoose and had to be weighed on the installment plan.

The body of Wm. Moustad of Barnum, Minn., was found in the weeds along the road west of Bottineau last week. The man had evidently been murdered two or three weeks earlier for his Ford car and his money. He was shot thru the head.

ORDINANCE NO. 23
BE IT ORDAINED BY the Board of City Commissioners of the City of Minot, North Dakota:
LOTTING.
Sec. 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to congregate or loiter upon any street corner, viaduct, or any other public place, without special permit to be issued by Auditor, or to sell themselves in the entrance to any business or office building, or otherwise interfere with the entrance or egress from such building.
Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the Police Department to strictly enforce this ordinance.
Sec. 3. PENALTY. Any person who violates any of the provisions of this Ordinance, shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not less than Ten Dollars, and the costs of such prosecution, or by imprisonment not exceeding ten days, or both.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 17
AN ORDINANCE MAKING THE ANNUAL APPROPRIATION FOR THE CITY OF MINOT FOR THE FISCAL YEAR COMMENCING SEPTEMBER 1st, 1922, AND ENDING AUGUST 31, 1923.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF PARK COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF MINOT, NORTH DAKOTA:
Sec. 1. That there be and hereby is appropriated the sums of money hereinafter designated being the amounts necessary to defray the expenses of the Park District of the City of Minot, North Dakota, and making the necessary improvements therefor for the fiscal year commencing September 1st, 1922, and ending August 31, 1923, as follows, to-wit:
General Fund—Expenses, \$17,400.00
Park Improvement Fund—\$7,000.00
Sec. 2. That there be and hereby is appropriated for the purpose of paying interest on outstanding indebtedness of said Park District of the City of Minot at maturity the sum of \$12,000.00.
Sec. 3. That there be and hereby is appropriated for the purpose of paying interest on the bonds of said Park District of the City of Minot, at maturity the sum of \$3,000.00.
The premises described in this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its approval, passage and publication.
