J. F. T. O'Connor, independent candidate for United States Senator, was brought up on a farm in Grand Forks County.

Received his early education in the public schools; later graduated from the University of North Dakota with the degrees of B. A. and LL. B., and M. A. Instructor in public speaking at Yale 1910-1912; has since practiced law in Grand Forks; has at the same time engaged extensively in farming in conjunction with his brothers, and personally devotes a part of every summer to farm work.

Elected a member of the Legislature in 1916 and reelected without opposition in 1918. Was supported for speaker in 1916 by Independent Republicans and Democrats. Has taken a firm stand against the socialistic schemes of the Nonpartisans, but has not hesitated to support measures he thought had merit, such as the state hall insurance, workmen's compensation law, etc.

As Democratic candidate for governor in 1920 he was defeated by only 4,680 votes, while Harding carried the state by 122,000 votes. This was prior to the damaging disclosures of Frank's mismanagement of public affairs.

He is admirably qualified to represent North Dakota in the United States Senate with credit to himself and the state. He will appreciate your vote and can be relied on to be a true representative of the people of this state.

The North Dakota Grain Grading Act.
