BONDS GO.

The Chautauqua Directory Bond to Pay Off Outstanding Indebtedness.

The stockholders of the Chautauqua Association held a meeting on Friday evening last at the office of John W. Maher according to a resolution of the board of directors at a meeting held on Dec. 17th, 1900. After the meeting was duly called to order and some preliminary matters attended to the following motion was put before the house and voted on by the stockholders. It was carried unanimously, not one dissenting vote being polled. This speaks well for the assembly and shows that all persons interested in the welfare of the association are working hand in hand. The exact motion is as follows: "Moved that the Devils Lake Chautauqua Association, of Devils Lake, North Dakota issue its bonds to the amount of \$7000.00 in denominations of \$25.00 each, drawing 7 per cent interest annually, payable in five years from the date of issue, the proceeds of said bonds to be used in the payment of the outstanding indebtedness of said Association. Said bonds to be convertible into stock of said Association or applied on the purchase price of lots bought of said Association, at the option of the holder. The said bonds to be issued and sold through the board of directors of said Association and signed by the president and secretary of said board, under the seal of said Association. Said bonds to be secured by mortgage upon all the real and personal property of said Association, to be given to Clark W. Kelley, as trustee, for the benefit of the holders of said bonds." After the motion was carried the stockholders meeting was adjourned and a meeting of the board of directors held. The board decided to have its trust deed executed and bonds printed at once, after which an effort will be made to sell the entire issue at once. On motion it was decided to secure Hon. Henry Watterson for a lecture at Chautauqua. The secretary was also instructed to procure Gen. Joe Wheeler, of Alabama, for a day or two at the assembly, preference being for the 4th and 5th of July. There is no question but either of the gentlemen mentioned would be drawing cards. Every person in the state with a drop of patriotic blood in his veins, would come here to hear Joe Wheeler, one of the greatest generals the United States had in the late war.

District Court.

The adjourned January term of the Ramsey county district court convened on Monday morning, with Judge Cowan presiding. The jury was not notified to be present until Wednesday morning and the entire time of Monday and Tuesday's sessions, was occupied in setting dates for the cases, settling and disposing of them and in the hearing of different motions for dismissals and continuances. All the attorneys of the city speak highly of Judge Cowan's manner of conducting the trials and proceedings and are satisfied with his rulings and decisions. His method of conducting trials is characterized by the same business ability which made him one of the best attorney generals North Dakota has ever had and he will save Ramsey county much expense, owing to the fact that he compels the attorneys to utilize every moment of time while court is in session. He allows no dilatory proceedings of any kind and in this way cannot but merit the approval, not only of the best attorneys, but of the entire community. There were 12 criminal cases on

the calendar and 50 civil cases and on Monday the cases were announced as settled, dates were set for them or they were dismissed as follows: Criminal cases, stricken from calendar: State of North Dakota vs. Thomas Edgar, State of North Dakota vs. Wm. Coburn, State of North Dakota vs. John Estes and Andrew Hogensen and State of North Dakota vs. Andrew Anderson. Edward Bice and Anthony Minnehan served the time imposed upon them by the justice and their case was dismissed by the states attorney. The case of State vs. William Stoesser was dismissed and the case against Louis W. Stoesser was carried over to the next term of the district court. The following cases in which the state is plaintiff were set for trial: State vs. Charles M. Grant; same vs. James Makada and Antone Ickhapi; same vs. John Berg and same vs. Edward Conway. State vs. Leslie Stenson was dismissed the same having been tried at the last term of court. The following civil cases were set for trial at this term of court: N. C.
