Memorial For Rev. Peale

Sunday evening, November 26, at the school house in Penn, a memorial service was held in remembrance of the five missionaries who were massacred October 28, 1905, at Lien Chon, China where the infuriated Chinese quickly killed Rev. John Rodgers Peale and his good wife, Mrs. Edward Charles Machie, Miss Amy Machie and Miss Eleanor Chestnut.

Rev. Peale preached in Penn last year where he organized the Presbyterian church and much of the exercises related to him, although all of the unfortunates received full attention. Mr. Peale was a young man of much intelligence and occupied a high place in moral, spiritual and christian development, displaying in modest beauty the virtues, purities and graciousness of a true student of Divinity, and his social nature, geniality and instructive and inspiring sermons brought him many friends in our community who learned to respect, honor and love him as an apostle of the Prince of Peace and the father of Beneficent Good, and all mourn his departure from the sphere of earth's action. His devoted wife of less than one year of endearments was also most zealous in extending christianity in the Flowery Kingdom, and all who perished were most faithful exponents of the ways of salvation as revealed in the Christ principles and divine laws operative in the redemption of souls from the thralldom of wrong and sin.

All the proceedings were replete with the sentiments of devotion to the dead and sympathy for the kins and friends bereft of their presence and gracious influence, but the words spoken and the songs sung made manifest the unwavering belief in the truth of immortality and a conscious, individual existence of the human spirit beyond the incident known as "death," which many of the wise and good claim is but the birth of the spirit into the higher and diviner life of celestial enfolding to those "who cease to do evil and learn to do good," and that the martyred christians now live in the supernal sphere or state of existence with the redeemed and good passed on before, where, under the dispensation of the Great Designer, they may aid in extending divine truth and holy grace for the whole of the brotherhood of man.

There was a very large attendance on the occasion. Rev. Armstrong, the Presbyterian minister of the Webster and Penn churches, conducted the exercises. Suitable and consoling resolutions were passed and a poem from the pen of Ex-Commissioner W. W. Barrett, entitled "The Christian Martyrs" was read by the minister, and music and songs were given in harmonic sweetness and when the benediction was given all felt a sacred influence tending to trust the issues of life with "Him who doeth all things well," yet mindful of all duties and obligations as Christians in all the shadows and sunshine, struggles, conflicts and joys of existence. We are informed that all the proceedings will be published in the religious and secular press.

Good Ideas From Norton

County Superintendent Norton has the following to say in reference to compulsory attendance in the county schools:

The letter of our present compulsory attendance laws requires that every child between the age of eight and fourteen who has not completed the common school course of study and who is not mentally or physically incapacitated for school work shall attend school every day during the time school is held in the district in which the child resides. The wise spirit of the law, which should be the more observed element, contemplates that every boy and girl in the state shall complete at least the common school course of study and thus have the advantages of a fair English education, without which no boy or girl is fitted to enter the busy world of today. We are living in a fast and progressive age and the farms, mines, factories and the business world in general are calling every day for competent young men and women, but it must be remembered that only those who are prepared will be accepted. In the light of these facts it does seem strange that many cases are to be found in this county where parents grossly neglect to keep their children in regular attendance at school even during the few months that school is offered in some of the districts. At first it would seem that the poverty of the parents must be the cause of this negligence. But such is not the case in this county. Investigation in almost every case proves that it is not poverty, but rather wealth and the greed for further gain that is the real cause. Something is surely radically wrong with our moral and social life and the aims of our people when parents, owning in their own right from a quarter section to two sections of the most productive land in the world, are found in this county who deprive their poor, helpless children of the advantages of a common school education in order that they may help at home to accumulate more dollars. This department is ready and willing to do everything within its power to see that every child in the country is given the educational advantages to which he is entitled. That the desired result may be at once effected we ask the active and vigorous assistance of every teacher and school officer in the county, of every reasonable parent, and of all others interested in our work.

WHEAT

Since the publication of our last review, a number of important developments touching the wheat situation have come to light. American wheat is practically on a basis where exports may be made, but the shortage of cars to transport the grain to the water has proved a considerable obstacle to a free foreign movement. As a result, stocks have increased at several of the primary points, despite the normal foreign demand.

In the Northwest, however, the intense activity of the mills has a tendency to hold down undue accumulations, and the shipments of flour are something tremendous.

The speculative wheat market is strongly supported on each side by the most powerful interests in the trade. This support is given openly, but without any blaze of trumpet. As a direct consequence of the stiffness in our markets, the foreigner has been obliged to come to us, and not we to him, as has been the custom in years past.

Alarmist rumors of locusts in the wheat fields of Argentina have been published and denied several times. It may be that the insect pests will shorten the yield of that important country, but it is too early to make a definite statement on that subject. Regarding the locust stories, we advise purchasers of wheat on conditions which are more clearly legitimate.


