THE DAKOTAS CONDITIONS IN EASTERNERS EAGER FOR DAKOTA LANDS—VALUES STEADILY GOING HIGHER.

The rapid change, says the Mandan Republican, in conditions in the Dakotas during the past decade is of remarkable interest to old settlers of the two states, who were here when land was a drug on the market, when settlers were few, conditions untried, and farms were to be had almost for the asking. A few years ago there were millions of acres of unoccupied government land to be had for filing upon it, and land in private ownership was held at low value and there was little sale for it.

This condition has passed and an Aberdeen News dispatch reflects the general condition when it says:

Thousands of people are arriving in Aberdeen every week in search of South Dakota lands. Last night one hotel turned away 100 applicants for rooms, and the other hostleries were similarly crowded. While farm lands were sold for \$20 an acre ten years ago and are now bringing \$45 and \$50, there has been no decrease in the demand for them.

In all parts of the state of North Dakota there is a healthy demand for farm land and the price of it is increasing steadily. The crop harvested this year will give the movement in real estate a big impetus, and with the increase in the sale of farm land will come continual and steady advances in city property. Out in the western part of the state where a few years ago were nothing but scattered ranches and range cattle, homesteaders and buyers by the thousand have settled up the country, and one of the biggest crops in the history of the state is being harvested. Conditions are changing so rapidly under the eyes of the people that they do not appreciate how North Dakota is coming into her own.
