THE WHIPPED CUR'S WAIL.

"From a business point of view the taxpayers of this county should see to it that the various offices are filled with men who are able to give the best service possible, and this applies particularly to the office of States Attorney. F. T. Cuthbert, who is the only Republican candidate is a lawyer of ability. . . . Legally, morally and otherwise he is a man that no person can say ought against. Size him up with the 'critter' that ran two years ago on the Democratic ticket. Which one do you want for your states attorney?"

The foregoing epistle was taken from the editorial column of the Edmore Herald-News, presumably the work of art of one F. T. Cuthbert, editorial writer for the local pig sheet, for we cannot lead ourselves to believe that Editor Cray, although he is a dead-in-the-wool stand pater would stoop so low as to take up a piece of literature such as this. But whoever is guilty of this frightful "spew" started out alright, but got off his trolley when he finished the first sentence.

It is true that F. T. Cuthbert is the only stand pat Republican candidate in the race for the office of States Attorney, but Mr. L. J. Wehe, the Progressive candidate for States Attorney made his announcement in the various county papers fully a month before Mr. Cuthbert came out and declared himself.

However, if Mr. Cray needs any information as to whether "anyone can say ought" against his favored candidate we might suggest for a sample that he look up Cuthbert's record as city attorney during the months of September and October, 1910, when an effort was being made to rid Ramsey County of blind piggers.

During the latter part of September, 1910 the following men were arrested for blind pigging in Ramsey county and their cases were all brought up for preliminary hearing before Justice Hilden of Starkweather: John Doe (Fross Wilmos), W. H. Reid, Sam Goldberg, John Wallace, Tom Slutz, H. Merry, William Foote, Otto Chlo-

tri, John Doe (M. Vagstad), also Nellie Rodgers who was arrested for operating a house of ill fame. In every one of these cases F. T. Cuthbert appeared as attorney for the defendant, Fred Traynor of Devils Lake acting as prosecuting attorney. On page 104, in sections 276-280, Charters and ordinances of the City of Devils Lake will be found an ordinance against the sale of intoxicating liquors, so, by taking part in the defense of parties charged with violating the state law against such law breaking, as well as an ordinance of the city of Devils Lake, F. T. Cuthbert disqualified himself to act as the legal representative of the City in enforcing the city ordinances on this subject. If a man will play a trick of this kind for mere fees what might he do if he were elected to the office of States Attorney?

During the time mentioned in the above paragraph, Laureas J. Wehe, now a candidate for the office of States Attorney on the Progressive Republican ticket, was appointed as Special Assistant to the Attorney General in which capacity he aided Attorney General Miller in cleaning up the filth and dirt which predominated in Ramsey County at that time.

Now we ask that questions, WHICH DO YOU WANT FOR YOUR STATES ATTORNEY? The man who defended violators of the law or the man who aided the authorities in giving these criminals their rightful punishment?

WOMANLY WISDOM.

If you grease the inner rim of a kettle its contents will never boil over.

Carry a lead-pencil in your pocket, and date the eggs as you gather them each day.

The range will keep black much longer if you rub the stove over with soap, then apply the blacking. Save all small pieces of soap for this purpose.

Keep your spices in glass bottles with screw tops—such as peanut-butter jars. A glance will tell you the contents, even if marked covers did get mixed.

To keep fish, never put one on top of another. Wrap a clean cloth out of cold salt water, wrap the fish separately in this, put them on a dish and keep on ice.

If you feel all run down and despondent, if you are not sleeping well, if you feel as if life were a real burden and that you must consult a doctor, just think it over. Perhaps all you need is to raise your bedroom window at night.

Rhubarb may be canned in cold water. Use freshly cut stalks, fit them tightly into a thoroughly clean jar and let the water run full force into the jar for fifteen minutes till air is excluded, screw on the top while the jar is still under water—see that it is perfectly air-tight—and the contents should keep and be like fresh rhubarb.

As a substitute for hot-water bags in ordinary ailments such as tooth-ache, earache and other minor pains, use common flannel bags made in convenient sizes, with drawstrings. Fill them with hot sand or salt, and they are safer than a cheap rubber bottle, just as efficacious, and much handier to use; keep a half-dozen ready. They are of great help in times of aches and pains.
