### PUBLIC TO BEWARE ALLEGED MARINE MAN

The latest thing in a bunco game comes from the office of the Marine recruiting district of Minnesota who is sending a warning to the public in regard to a man going under the name of "Captain Gettman" and who says he is in charge of the Minnesota district. He is branded as a fraud and is said to be travelling through the middle west and northwestern states. The following letter from the recruiting station explains the matter.

To the Editors of all Newspapers and Periodicals in the Middle West and Northwest.

Dear Sirs—For the protection of the public and in the interest of the United States Marine Corps, I request that you publish this communication. I have been informed that Mr. S. M. Orton, of Watab, Minn., that a certain individual is travelling in Watab and vicinity under the title of Captain E. I. Gettman, U. S. Marine Corps, in charge of the United States Marine corps recruiting station Minneapolis, Minn.

Concerning this, I desire to inform the public that this man is an imposter. Besides the undersigned there is no marine corps officer on recruiting service or any other duty in Minnesota and the Dakotas and Northern Wisconsin. There is no officer named "Gettman" in the United States Marine Corps or United States Navy.

In view of the fact that the above mentioned impersonator is a fraud, I desire to caution the public not to extend any credit to or enter into any contract with this person, as such action would inevitably result in loss for the victim.
