

ROAD SHOPMEN TO ASK RAISE

Machinists and Boilermakers, Report Says, are Framing Demand for Higher Wages.

Railroad machinists, boilermakers and shopmen in the Northwest will draw up demands for more pay, to be presented to the general managers by June 1, according to reliable information. As yet the managers have received no official communication from the men, but some of the managers have been informed that such a movement is on foot. They may investigate the situation shortly.

The news caused great surprise in railroad official circles. It was supposed that after settling with the trainmen, engineers and firemen recently, the labor horizon for the next two or three years would be free from clouds. Practically all classes of organized labor on the railroads have been granted advances the past few years.

The shopmen have shared in these increases but it is said they are not satisfied. They say that their pay has been raised but little, as compared with what the other employees have obtained, and firemen, who got an advance of about 10 per cent.

Some of the shopmen, it is learned from official sources, made demands on the railroads last fall. They were granted the improved working conditions and told that should business conditions improve in the spring negotiations in regard to pay might be taken up.

"I have not heard from the men," said a general manager this morning, "but it would not surprise me to find that the report of their demands is correct."

"It is said that the railroads will not grant the demands, but will fight," it was suggested.

"I think so," replied the official. "The railroads have about reached the limit of increased wages."

The boilermakers went on a strike three years ago. The men were beaten, but it is said they have reorganized.

Make It Rain in July.

In the spring when the soil is compact and moist about an inch of moisture will evaporate a week. Harrowing the land loosens up the surface and stops this evaporation. The soil mulch can be maintained after the crop is planted by harrowing after it is up from three to eight or nine inches. In this way the moisture that would otherwise evaporate can be saved up till the crops need it in July and August.

VANDALISM.

Sauter Township School House Broken Into and Rifled.

It isn't often that such acts of vandalism occur in this neighborhood, as

came to light Tuesday morning of this week, when the "Husa" school in Sauter township was invaded. Seats were found to have been turned over, windows broken, pencils and other school supplies taken away and other lawless acts committed. There is very strong circumstantial evidence to show that the perpetrators of the outrageous acts were young Isaac Kujala and his companion, one Backman.

The two were seen, by a farmer living near the school house, going towards the school late Monday night. Tuesday morning the men stopped at Husa's place and claimed to have stayed over night at the Udellus farm. After the discovery that the school house had been broken into and rifled, inquiries were made amongst neighbors and it was found that no lodgings had been asked by the men at any of the neighboring farms.

Kujala, one of the suspects, has a reputation that is not to be envied. Being only about 22 years of age he is already a graduate of the state penitentiary, besides a course in the county jail.

A year ago last fall he was sentenced by Ramsey county court to serve a year at hard labor in the state "pen" for assault with a dangerous weapon; having almost severed a man's throat with a knife in a drunken brawl at Lawton. Two years before that he was sent, with three other men, to the county jail for a month's term for disturbing the peace and making threats at a farm house near Brocket.

Since his release from the "pen" he has made threats of what he is going to do to those who acted as interpreter and witnesses in his assault case.

It is to be hoped that the Walsh county authorities will take the matter vigorously in hand and teach the rowdies to leave property, public and private, alone, and insure safety of persons in this community.—Brocket News.

FIRE TEAM STOLEN

Thieves Steal Costly Span From the Jamestown City Department.

Jamestown, N. D., March 25.—The Jamestown city fire team was stolen last night from the fire hall. The team consisted of a pair of heavy blacks worth \$600. The chains which kept the horses in the stalls were forced from their fastenings with a crow bar. No trace of the thieves has yet been secured.
