In Banking Business.

Balfour Statesman: It will be interesting news to all the older residents of the county that C. D. Rice, who was

for many years, clerk of the district court of McHenry county, and for four years was state senator, has been elected president of the First National bank of Northfield, Minn. Since his removal to Northfield some years ago for the purpose of educating his children, Mr. Rice has taken a very prominent part in the financial affairs of that city and of Carleton college. The bank of which he has been elected president has a capital stock of \$75,000, and surplus and profits of \$62,000; the total resources of the bank, according to the last statement, were \$897,926.24. Mr. Rice still has large and varied interests in this section and yet feels there is no place like McHenry county.

Andrew Hedman Dead.
Andrew Hedman, a pioneer North Dakotan, died at the Nurmi residence, in Enterprise township, at the age of 74 years and 4 months. Mr. Hedman was born in Finland and emigrated to the United States while yet a very young man; working in the mines in the Northern peninsula of Michigan until the year 1855, when he came to North Dakota, took up land and made a home for himself and family.
