**COMMERCIAL CLUB WILL MAKE AMPLE ARRANGEMENTS FOR ENTERTAINING THEM.**

Devils Lake is included in the route of the Grand Forks automobile club in its annual tour, which will leave Grand Forks August 15. The route follows: First day: Grand Forks to Lakota to Devils Lake. **NARROW ESCAPE WHEN HORSES FALL—BARTLETT HOME IS SCENE OF BLAZE.**

The home of Mr. Bartlett on 14th Street was completely destroyed by fire this afternoon and but a portion of his household goods saved. **FIRST PRIMARY ON THE UNITED STATES PRESIDENT WILL BE HELD HERE.**

According to a dispatch from Minneapolis all eyes are on North Dakota and this state will be the battle ground attracting the attention of the entire country next March, when this state will vote in a popular primary on its choice for the next presidential nominations of the various political parties. This will be the first primary on the United States presidents.

A statement issued from Washington by Senator Jonathan Bourne, jr., president of the National Republican Progressive league, calls attention to the fact that though Oregon was the first state to adopt the plan of a presidential primary election, three other states will hold their primaries in 1912 before Oregon. The first primary of the kind will be in North Dakota, while Wisconsin will vote on the presidential candidates April 2, and Nebraska April 17. The Oregon primary will be held April 19 and New Jersey, the only eastern state that has adopted the plan, will vote on May 23.

**COUNTY OFFICIALS IN ANNUAL GATHERING IN DEVILS LAKE TODAY—AUTO TRIP ON.**

**BUSINESS MEET AND SPEECHES FORM IMPORTANT PART FOR TOMORROW.**

The state association of County Registers of Deeds started in annual convention here this afternoon. Pleasure occupied the attention of the visitors today, the business meeting being scheduled to take place tomorrow morning. H. H. Berg of Towner, McHenry county, arrived this afternoon and called the meeting to order, the registers adjourning immediately to enjoy an auto ride about the city and to Chautauqua. Secretary Wacker of Washburn did not arrive and possibly will not attend the meeting.

The session tomorrow will consist of an address of welcome by Mayor McClary, and an address on the latest laws applying to the work of the registers will be made by Attorney Fred Traynor of this city. The appointment of committees, election of officers and selection of the next place of meeting will take place in the morning.

**To Children's Home.**  
Pearl and Cleo Barnell of Starkweather, were taken today to the Children's Home at Fargo on order of Judge Henry of the Probate Court, the parents being unable on account of financial conditions to give them proper care.

**IS LOST. REQUIRED TWENTY-FIVE PER CENT OF THE VOTERS TO SIGN THE REQUEST.**

The assessors returns show that the proposition of redistricting commissioner districts No. 1 and 2 failed. A petition which was sent out some time ago in order to equalize the commissioner districts, required the signatures of twenty-five per cent of the voters in each district. The assessors returns show there was not enough signers to the petition, hence the proposition was lost. The equalization board is still in session, the city books were turned in this morning, after a thorough overhauling by the city board, and the commissioners are now busy equalizing the city books. Quite a number have appeared before the board with reference to the assessments.

**THE WORDS OF DENNY O'BRIEN ARRANGED FOR STEALING HARTMAN'S BICYCLE.**

"If you prosecute me, I will not tell you where the bicycle is." Such were the words of Denny O'Brien in Judge McClary's court this morning when he was arraigned on the charge of stealing a bicycle of E. E. Hartman in Sullivan township. Denny borrowed the bicycle to go to the neighbors, but kept on going and was picked up here after disposing of the wheel. He was bound over to the district court under \$500 bonds this morning.

**BOARD OF EQUALIZATION WILL HOLD MEETING AT BISMARCK AUG. 1.**

The state board of equalization, comprising Governor Burke, Attorney General Miller, Commissioner of Agriculture and Labor Gilbreath, State Auditor Brightbill and State Treasurer Olson, will meet at the state capital Aug 1 for its formal session.

Blank forms were sent out last week to the express companies, telegraph companies, car equipment companies and railroads. There are three hundred and eighty telephone companies doing business in the state, about eighty car equipment companies, five express companies and nine railroads. The board anticipates a busy session when it is convened.

**INJUNCTION ORDER SERVED ON HERMAN STENSETH ON RECENT COURT ACTION.**

Papers were filed today in the local druggists violation of the liquor laws cases, being in the nature of an injunctive order, restraining Herman Stenseth, clerk of court, from transferring the records in the five druggist cases from Ramsey county to Nelson county.

**CLAIM JUDGE BUTTZ WAS WITHOUT JURISDICTION IN CHANGE TO NELSON COUNTY.**

Attorneys McClary and Cuthbert of this city and Attorney Kelly of Lakota, who file the petition and restraint, set forth that when the motion was granted for the change, due to the impossibility of securing a fair trial here, that C. W. Buttz, who was acting judge of the district court, had no jurisdiction and the court was what is termed a pretended court. The cases were set to come up before Judge Templeton at Lakota next Monday.

**HARMONIOUS GATHERING OF FORWARDERS OF PAPER MILL HELD YESTERDAY.**

**CAMPAIGN WILL BE STARTED AT ONCE TO LET PEOPLE KNOW OF WONDERFUL PLANT.**

Publicity is the keynote of the Commercial club committee working on the Paper Mill proposition. A meeting was held yesterday and it was decided by the committee to start an active campaign setting forth the benefit of the new manufacturing plant to Devils Lake.

Everybody will be interested in the proposition before the committee gets through and the harmonious gathering yesterday was enthusiastic enough to assure all that no stone will be left unturned in bringing forth the desired results.

**WHEN TIME COMES FOR LISTING PARTY VOTERS, TROUBLE IS DUE TO BEGIN.**

There are breakers ahead for the North Dakota assessors in 1912 when the first effect of the law requiring the listing of voters according to their party affiliations will be seen. This law which has just gone into effect but which does not become operative until next March, when the local assessors take up their work, promises to give the kinds of trouble, as it is hardly to be supposed that all voters will submit tamely to pre-election declaration of their party affiliations, especially when such declaration must be made about three months before the date set for the primary election.

**Expense of Running Ramsey County is Cheaper This Year**

The expenses of running Ramsey county during the past year have been somewhat less than in previous years and especially last year, and great credit is due County Auditor Bice and his efficient corps of co-workers in the county office for this prevailing feature. During the past year the total figures reach \$96,374.76. Of this amount \$24,000 is for the building of the new jail, nearly \$1,000 refund of primary election fees, \$5,000 for election expenses, \$2,000 repairs on buildings and grounds and \$1,000 for refund of drainage tax, bringing the expense for running the county down to \$69,000, as compared with \$76,000 spent last year. The county interest from July 1, 1910 to July 1, 1911 is \$2,655.

**DEVILS LAKE CITY RETURNS SHOW THAT A TRUANT OFFICER IS NEEDED.**

**REPORT SHOWS 120 OF SCHOOL AGE NOT ATTENDING—960 CHILDREN ENROLLED.**

A truant officer is needed in Devils Lake, judging from the school census given out by Superintendent of Schools Haig today, as 120 children of the school age are reported not in attendance at school. This is largely responsible for the falling off in attendance this year, only 960 being enrolled in the city schools.

The number of boys enrolled is 444 and the number of girls 516, of this number 951 are white children and 9 are colored. The number of children attending private schools is 100. Number proficient in regular branches 44, number mentally incapacitated 4, attending elsewhere 11, not attending 120, making the total non attendance 279.
