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
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DAY BUT WIN FROM MINNESOTA SATURDAY.

BEST DIAMOND BATTLE EVER SEEN TOOK PLACE AT CHAUTAUGA SATURDAY.

The baseball attraction in Devils Lake the last couple of days has kept the fans in a constant pitch of excitement and although something went wrong with the locals in yesterday's game, the one on Saturday made up for any deficiency that might be forthcoming in any of the games scheduled. Devils Lake took two out of three in the series, winning the first game by a score of 2 to 1, the second 3 to 2, and losing the last to the Gopher state champions by a score of 6 to 2. By winning the games this city is placed in the front rank in the independent baseball organizations of the Northwest and only has to defeat Valley City and Jamestown to put a clincher on the state title, unless the games with the Grand Forks Picketts this week turn out differently than is anticipated.

Saturday's Game.

All have looped the loop, flipped the flop and divers other things known to park amusement, but as a result of Saturday's game something new was conceived by the fans, known as "Tooting the Toot."

This new park device is the result of so much tooting which Toot Thompson received as a result of getting his base on balls in the ninth inning when the score was 2 to 2, stealing second while the pitcher was playing hockey with the ball and then going third on an overthrow of Brenner, the Alexandria pitcher, to second, coming home on a nice hit between short and third by Jack Zaluski, bringing in the winning score, making the total Devils Lake 3, Alexandria 2.

It was a nerve racking contest, made more so by the superb work of Caylor for the Lakers and Brenner for the visitors, save for the fatal mistake made by Brenner in the ninth. O'Brien was sent to the mound for the visitors but lasted quick and Brenner took the exalted position. Caylor for the Lake struck to the post, however, and pitched a gilt edged article that was indeed necessary to win the fracas.

The Runs Were Made.

Alexandria scored in the first inning, after two were down. Thrall and Knox struck out but Stevens and Olson each got two baggers, which meant a score. Burke went out from Caylor to Lipps. Score 1 to 0.

Devils Lake came back in its half of the second. Thompson went out from Knox to Crole, Zaluski got a two-bagger and came home on a hit by Lipps. Lipps came home on Caylor's hit but Caylor was caught stretching it to a two-bagger. Wilson landed the bag but Chief Thompson went out Olson to Crole. Score Devils Lake 2; Alexandria 1.

Alexandria evaded matters up in the fourth. Stevens fanned, Olson got a two-bagger and came home on an error of Burke's grounder by the Chief. Crole went out Toots to Lipps and Hodgins struck out. Score 2 to 2.

JAPAN WILL NOT INTERFERE WITH PROPOSITION TO MAKE ARBITRATION GOOD.

London, England, July 10.—The English government wants revised Japanese treaty so that arbitration clauses with the United States and England will hold good. Japan is not expected to make any objection.

CASE WILL BE GIVEN CHANGE OF VENUE.

PREJUDICE AGAINST JUDGE AND COUNTY IN FAMOUS LEMKE FORGERY TRIAL.

Lakota, N. D., July 10.—In the celebrated Sperry murder case which came up this afternoon at 1:30 o'clock at the opening of court here before Judge Templeton, an affidavit of prejudice was filed by Attorneys Frick & Kelly against the judge, which means that the case will be transferred to another district. In the matter of the Fred Lemke forgery case, the other big one on the criminal calendar, affidavits of prejudice against the judge and the county was filed by Attorney John Samson of Devils Lake and this case will also go elsewhere. There are about seven blind pig cases on the criminal calendar and about twenty civil actions will be brought for jury trial, which will keep the court in session here about two weeks.

LEADING LADY WHO WILL BE IN DEVIS LAKE TO BE MARRIED.

Devils Lake theatre lovers, who are awaiting with eager expectation the coming of the "Flower of the Ranch" which will be here on July 14, will be interested in the following dispatch from Minneapolis:

A romance which began last year when the couple met on a vaudeville circuit was brought to light today when Miss Betty Caldwell, leading lady in "The Flower of the Ranch," playing a special week's engagement at the Lyric theatre, and Douglas McGregor, a member of the "Prince of Tonight" company, will be married. A license was issued at noon today and the couple refuse to divulge the hour of the ceremony.

Miss Caldwell is "Little Flower" of the company and met Mr. McGregor last year on the Pacific coast. They are said to have met again by chance in Minneapolis. Mr. McGregor will leave in a few days to join the "Prince of Tonight" company at Chicago and will be joined later by his bride.

DID CONSIDERABLE DAMAGE IN MORRIS TOWNSHIP TO GULF AND NELSON.

The severe windstorm last Friday night north-east of Devils Lake, traversed the eastern portion of North Minnevaucan township and gained velocity until it acquired the force of a small tornado by the time it reached Morris township, doing quite considerable damage to the Martin Gulseth and the G. P. Nelson and Whitford (or Thelin) farm buildings. At the last named farm it demolished the chicken-coop and tore the roof off the barn and damaged the farm machinery of the tenant, Mr. Ervin Ek, whose loss is covered by windstorm insurance in the Powell agency. Mr. G. P. Nelson had recently renewed his fire insurance with Powell, but did not see the necessity of carrying cyclone insurance.

H. H. Hanlon, adjuster for the Security Insurance Co., is already on the ground in Morris and Noonan Townships, adjusting the cyclone losses. Powell believes in quick action for his patrons.

HAVE ARRANGED MATTERS SATISFACTORILY TO PRESENT TO FEDERAL GOVERNMENT.

New York, N. Y., July 10.—The Standard Oil Company has arranged the trust dissolution proposition satisfactory to them and will present the matter to the Federal government for approval within a few days.

HILLSBORO SHOOTING AFFAIR GOES OVER TERM—ONE OF VICTIMS IN HOSPITAL.

Hillsboro, N. D., July 10.—The McLaen-Cooper murder case was continued over-term at the opening of court here. Ross, who was shot in the back, is still in the hospital and was unable to appear. Great doubts are entertained as to his recovery.

CAVED IN THE LARGE GAS CONTAINER OF THE RED RIVER POWER COMPANY.

Grand Forks, N. D., July 10.—The fierce wind of Saturday night did considerable damage in the city. The large gas container of the Red River Power company, composed of steel, was caved in by the wind.

TREATY WILL BE VOTED UPON BY SENATE EITHER JULY 17 OR JULY 20, SURE.

Washington, D. C., July 10.—The reciprocity treaty will be voted on by the senate July 17 or July 20 according to announcement made this morning.

RAINS AND COOLER TEMPERATURE HELP SOUTHWESTERN PORTIONS CONSIDERABLY.

Washington, D. C., July 10.—South Dakota has had very heavy rains and the drought in the Southwest has been broken.

Bacon, of the Grand Forks Evening Times, and George Winship, of the Herald, had signed the papers which means that the Herald has been sold to the Times and the two papers will be consolidated, although morning and evening editions will continue to be issued as in the case now. No announcement has been made by the new management. It is understood that the purchase price was \$125,000.
