## PATRICK M'DONALD HURRIED HERE FROM EDMORE BUT DIED LAST NIGHT.

LITTLE HOPE WAS ENTERTAINED FOR HIS RECOVERY AT ANY TIME—OPERATED ON.

Was Jumping From a Load of Hay and Put Fork Out to Balance Himself—Weighed 224 Pounds, Making Matters Still Worse, the Implement Entering Body a Considerable Distance.

An accident which resulted fatally occurred yesterday afternoon at Edmore when Patrick McDonald was severely injured when he jumped on a pitchfork which entered his body, extending through the perineum.

Mr. McDonald was descending from a load of hay when he put out the fork to balance himself. It slipped from his hand and he jumped and fell directly upon the fork, inflicting the severe wound.

What made the accident worse is the fact that McDonald weighed 224 pounds, thus the fork entered his body a considerable distance.

The injured man was taken at once to Devils Lake and arrived here shortly before 4 o'clock yesterday, when he was operated on at the general hospital.

He passed away shortly after 8 o'clock last night. Little hope is known about the man, who was a farm hand. He has relations at Pittsburg who have been notified of his death and his body will be held here pending word from them.

## CIRCUS FOLLOWERS ENTERED HOME THIS MORNING—POLICE ON THE TRACK OF CROOKS.

The home of a man by the name of Peterson living near the Great Northern track was entered this morning presumably by some of the crooks, attracted by a circus and a shot gun and some clothes taken. The police were notified as soon as the family returned home and discovered the loss and they are already in possession of several clues.

LATER: The clothes were found this afternoon having been sold for three dollars. The police are on the trail of the robber.

## CHARGED WITH RAPE. Sensational McHenry County Case Is Transferred.

Towner, N. D., July 29.—The case of the State vs. Roy Stevenson, a sensational rape case of McHenry county, was transferred to Ward county and will come before Judge Leighton at Minot sometime next week.

One cannot help but feel more than kindly towards the people in charge who are so kind in showing visitors through the school."

## MINNESOTA GOVERNOR IS INVITED TO TALK ON RECIPROCITY BASIS.

St. Paul, Minn., July 28.—Due to the agitation which is now being aroused in Canada an invitation has been extended to Governor Ederhardt of Minnesota, asking him to speak before the Canadian club at Port Arthur on the reciprocity basis. The American view is now in demand by the Canadians in the war that is being waged over the treaty which passed the senate.

## Opera House for Michigan. Plans have been made for a handsome new opera house which is to be erected at Michigan City this fall.
