J. Martinson, better known as the "Millionaire Brakeman," was arrested in Devils Lake today by Chief of Police Barnes. Martinson was wanted at Minot on a charge of blind pigging and Sheriff Kelly of the Magic City will arrive here on No. 2 tonight to take Martinson back to Minot on No. 1, to serve his uncompleted sentence of ninety days.

When Martinson, who has one arm, was committed to jail, he became sick and his arm proved to be in bad shape. He was taken from the jail to the hospital and after he recovered he did not return to jail to finish his term but rather came to Devils Lake and was arrested here yesterday.

Martinson was famous in Devils Lake about a year ago and got his name as the "Millionaire Brakeman," having fallen heir to several thousand dollars as a result of losing his arm in a Great Northern railroad accident. He spent his money lavishly until it was gone, when he resorted to violating the prohibition law at Minot, where he was sentenced to 60 days in jail and \$100 fine, in default of which he was to serve 90 days additional.

COST OF BICKFORD TRIAL

Burling County Must Foot the Bills Which Total Over \$3,000.

Bismarck Tribune: Burling county up to date has paid costs in the case of the state against Bickford in the sum of \$3,201.57. It will be recalled that the Bickford case started in Burleigh district court. Later a change of venue was taken to McLean county and the case was tried there, the defendant being convicted.

The amount of court costs and attorney fees in Burleigh county is \$1,149.26. The change of venue costs from McLean county is \$2,052.31.

SEVERAL CUPS ARE OFFERED

John McGuire the man from Kansas City, who was arrested in Devils Lake and charged with being a confidence man, having in his possession a gambling device for cutting cards, which he intended using during the Minot lottery, entered a plea of guilty in the district court late yesterday afternoon and was fined \$100 and costs.

McGuire was arrested through work of Andy Sullivan Great Northern official, and turned over to the officers here. He was tried in justice court and bound over to the district court on \$300 bonds.

During the progress of the hearing here McGuire had telegrams from his home saying that he was O. K., and also received plenty of money. He also received word that his house had burned down while he was under arrest here.

The trial caused a sensation in Devils Lake due to the many fake schemes, such as card games, and silk which McGuire had in his possession. The card device McGuire said he got from a friend on the loan of money, while the silk he purchased from an aviator for his wife who was sick in the hospital at Utah, where he said he was going after his arrest here.

States Attorney Duell appeared for the prosecution at the hearing here and Attorney J. J. Samson defended McGuire.

DELEGATES MAY GO FROM HERE DURING THE RELIGION CAMPAIGN WEEK.

Grand Forks, N. D., Oct. 7.—It has been announced today that the state Y. M. C. A. convention of North Dakota will be held in this city on March 15, 16 and 17. The dates selected bring the delegates here on the last three days of the campaign week of the Men and Religion Forward movement, which will be held March 10 to 17 inclusive.

The campaign week of the religion movement was expected to have been held here on March 18 to 24, but owing to conflicts and other reasons, the dates were set a week ahead. As many of the delegates to be here at that time will be interested in the Y. M. C. A. work, it was decided to hold the state association meeting at the same time.

It is understood that a number of new projects will be talked over at the coming state meeting of the Y. M. C. A. Minot, Devils Lake, Bismarck, Dickinson, Mandan, Williston, which are without associations at the present time are expected to send delegations. It is understood that the coming year will see branches of the Y. M. C. A. established in at least two of the six places named.

Minot, Devils Lake, Dickinson and Bismarck have National Guard armories at the present time. These in some way compensate for the lack of an association building, but it is expected that an effort will be made to locate branches in those cities.

The committee is working at the present time on the program for the convention. A number of speakers from the twin cities will be secured.
