AGREES TO THROW ALL THREE IN AN HOUR--M'GURREN MAY BE ONE OF THEM.

Farmer Jahns, of Southern Minnesota fame, was an arrival in the city today and is endeavoring to arrange several wrestling matches, and has an appointment with McGurren, the Cray champion, to meet him here today and arrange for a match, although no definite terms have been agreed upon.

Farmer Jahns agrees to throw any three North Dakota wrestlers in an hour's time and should the offer be accepted the match will likely be pulled off in Devils Lake in the near future.

KIFF IS STRONG FOR L. B. HANNA

HEAD OF STATE PROHIBITIONISTS SAYS CONGRESSMAN IS RIGHT MAN FOR GOVERNOR.

"I am, personally, so well satisfied with Hon. L. B. Hanna as a gubernatorial candidate that I will make every effort to have the prohibition party of the state endorse Mr. Hanna's candidacy and not put up a state ticket. From what I can learn of the sentiment of other prohibitionists, I think this opinion prevalent."

The foregoing statement was made by H. H. Kiff, chairman of the North Dakota Prohibition State Central committee.

"I am on my way," continued Mr. Kiff, "to Chicago to attend a meeting of the national prohibition committee and will explain the North Dakota situation there."

"I have known Mr. Hanna ever since his arrival in the old Dakota Territory. I have watched his personal life, his business and public career, and believe that his personal record, his votes in both branches of the state legislature and his position in congress entitle him to the support of every temperance worker and believer in law enforcement of North Dakota."

With the possibility of securing such a man for executive, a man who fills our ideals for the position, there seems to be no necessity for putting up a candidate of our own."

Mr. Kiff, after his return from Chicago will go to Portland, Ore., where he will spend the winter. He has sold his business at Tower City and will return to his home next April.

COWLEY BOOMED FOR CONGRESS

BROTHER OF MIKE COWLEY OF THIS CITY CONSIDERED A PROBABLE CANDIDATE.

Attorney Stephen J. Cowley, brother of "M. J." of this city and formerly a resident of Grand Forks county, having engaged in the practice of law at Devils Lake, is being considered as a probable candidate on the Democratic ticket in Montana for congress next year. Mr. Cowley, however, in an interview at Great Falls, declares that he is not an aspirant for honors of that nature. Here is what the Great Falls Tribune has to say of Mr. Cowley:

"The Western News of Libby is working out the political chess game just now trying to decide what each party ought to do for the good of the commonwealth in the selection of candidates. Its comment is interesting in as much as it says three local men are pretty prominent in connection with the consideration of their names as among the available for the congressional honors next year."

"Speaking of Deputy County Attorney Stephen J. Cowley, it says: 'Steve Cowley, assistant deputy attorney of Great Falls, is one of the state's bright young men. It's really too bad he's a democrat. We've got several job lots of political junk on our hands which we will trade and give a good bonus for Cowley. He was in Libby last year during the campaign and it can be safely said he made the best political talk from his side of the matter heard here during last year's unpleasantness. He's a candidate for congress, under certain conditions, and having come fresh from intimate relations with Governor Burke of North Dakota, with whom Mr. Cowley blushed political blankets for some time, the chances are good that he will not make the mistake of getting in where he should not and that when he does get in it will be at the right time. He's a democrat, is Young Cowley.'"

"All this sounds very good to Great Falls people and is a very pretty consideration of the man whom their Great Falls friends believe are worthy of the coveted post, but according to some of them, at least they have no light on the subject for congressional honors. Mr. Cowley was shown the reference to him in the News and he said he appreciated the nice things said but that under no conditions was he a candidate for the high honor of congressional representative. He said that he was not out for any political honor at all and under no conditions whatever would he allow his name to be considered for the nomination for representative."

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WHEEL OF JUSTICE IS TURNING RAPIDLY

PROGRESS HAS BEEN REMARKABLE WORK IN OTHER COUNTIES DEMANDS ACTION.

The wheels of justice at the district court of Ramsey county continue to turn and the cases set for trial are being disposed with as speedily as possible. There are a number of cases still on the docket set for hearing and as the dates for court at other places are set for the near future, it means close adherence to business for those officially in charge in order to clear the calendar and permit the court to meet other hearings.

The case on the civil calendar of S. A. Fann vs. Ole Hilda was decided in favor of the plaintiff and judgment was rendered as no appearance was made.

The case of the Great Western Assurance Co. vs. Arthur Shumway and A. H. Fel, and R. Goer, was taken from the jury and submitted to the court.

The case of Ole Anderson vs. the Edmore Implement Co., was dismissed by the consent of the attorney of both the plaintiff and defendant.

The case of Harry Merelock vs. Fred Vannier was dismissed without prejudice by the attorneys.

On the criminal calendar, the case of the state vs. M. Maesen was dismissed, upon application of the special states attorney.

The action of John T. Anderson and Oscar R. Anderson vs. J. M. Thompson and the Devils Lake State Bank is on for trial this afternoon and is taking the attention of the court.

THREE FROM BENSON COUNTY WERE SENTENCED TO THE PEN BY JUDGE COWAN TODAY

INDIAN WHO SHOT AT HIS BROTHER AND KNOX DEPOT BURGGLARS SENTENCED.

Three prisoners of Benson county were brought over from Minnewaukan today by States Attorney Sines, Clerk of Court Duncan and Sheriff Talley and arraigned before Judge Cowan here, all pleading guilty to the various charges.

Benedict Sherman, an Indian, whom it will be remembered was mentioned exclusively in the World as having shot at his brother at Fort Totten at the time of the Indian fair, pleaded guilty to the charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, and was sentenced to one year at the state penitentiary.

Frank O'Neil was sentenced to one year for burglary and Earl LeNora was sentenced to fifteen months on the same charge, the two having entered the depot at Knox, N. D., making away with considerable cash.

The men will probably be taken to Bismarck to commence their sentences at once.

PICKERING WILL NOT BE IN GAME

WISCONSIN ASKED TO INVESTIGATE THE CHARGES AGAINST FOUL PLAYERS.

Minneapolis, Minn., Nov. 16.—The University of Minnesota has withdrawn Captain Pickering from the Wisconsin game Saturday and later will make a thorough investigation of his standing. Minnesota also will ask Wisconsin to investigate charges against Molt, Tanberg, Mackmiller and Hoefel.
