VITAL STATISTICS.

NOTICE TO PROPER OFFICERS: Wherein physician is employed it shall be the duty of the parents to give notice to the proper officer within whose jurisdiction they reside, of the births and deaths of their children, or of the presence of any infectious or contagious disease occurring within their household, within twenty-four hours or three days if outside of incorporated limits of cities, towns or villages, as to births and deaths only, of such occurrence and the oldest person next of kin, the keeper or other proper officer of every workhouse, poorhouse, reform school, jail, prison, hospital, asylum, or other public or charitable institution, shall give like notice of any birth death, infectious or contagious disease occurring among the persons under his charge. Whoever neglects or refuses to give such notice within the period of twenty-four hours, or three days if outside of incorporated limits of cities, towns and villages as to births and deaths only after the occurrence of such birth, death or infectious or contagious disease, shall upon conviction forfeit a sum not to exceed twenty dollars, to be collected as other fines are collected, by law.

BUY TOWNER NATIONAL BANK

A. I. Hunter and J. R. Carley, vice president and cashier respectively, of the First National Bank of Grand Forks have purchased the controlling interest in the Towner First National Bank. D. N. Tallman, president of the Towner institution, figured on the selling side of the deal.

Mr. Carley succeeds Mr. Tallman as president of the Towner bank, and both Grand Forks men become members of the board of directors. Mr. Tallman retains a minority interest and remains on the board.

The Towner First National bank was organized by Mr. Tallman and his associates in 1905, and was the first financial institution in McHenry county to take out a national charter.

TRAPPERS MAKE BIG MONEY

Schafer, N. D., Dec. 30—L. Prettywood and J. E. Wilson have trapped six large timber wolves, 127 coyotes, four wild cats and a large number of fur bearing animals this winter. They secured a bounty of \$322.50 on the coyotes and a combined bounty of \$67.50 on each gray wolf, in addition to the value of the hides which they estimate to be worth \$1,000. They regard the work as rather remunerative. The stockmen are greatly elated over the capture of the grey timber wolves which have been destroying considerable cattle.
