## COMMERCIAL CLUB CHANGE BY-LAWS

## DAIRIES PAY MORE THAN GOLD MINES

La Crosse, Wis., Feb. 22—That \$90,000,000 is realized annually in the dairy business in Wisconsin which is \$16,000,000 in excess of the total gold yield of California, Colorado, Nevada and Alaska was the assertion of Prof. M. J. Hoppert of the bureau of animal husbandry in Wisconsin university in his opening address at the La Crosse Agricultural school's annual farm school.

Mr. Hoppert declared further that one-third of the dairy cows in Wisconsin are kept at a loss because they are not up to standard or kept in the best possible condition. In selecting a cow the general appearance and condition should be considered first, and the amount of milk she in giving must be a secondary consideration. A dairy cow should not weigh less than 800 lbs and should have a large capacity for food, well-developed milk organs and perfect health.

## A GREAT FREAK OF NATURE

The latter part of the week W. B. Smith, the well known farmer of Hammar, was a visitor in the city and he had with him a monstrosity in the way of a double headed lamb, which was still born on his farm and which he has mounted as a curiosity. This lamb has two bodies, two heads, four eyes, four legs in front and two behind and has three tails. It is certainly a freak and attracted considerable attention at the Colonial hotel where he had it exhibited.


