The secretary said that the act is "inadequate" and that it "does not provide for a fair and equitable compensation to the injured miner or his dependents."

Milk For Calves. The young calf should never be overfed. Its stomach is not large, and the ordinary calf should not have more than a pint and a half or two pints of milk at a feeding when very young.
